Mr. Hammond Kelly is feeling greatly pleased over the fact that his beautiful horse Kentucky Marquis, 2.08 1/2 won the coveted honor in the Standard bred class at the Horse Show carrying off the championship for this Province.

Mr. Kelly bought this equine beauty at the Madison Square Horse Sale last November. He is very fast, having repeatedly shown miles better than 2.10 over a half mile track. He has also some valuable coils in the United States, one with a record of 2.21 as a yearling, which was the fastest performance in the United States the year it was made. Mr. Kelly has brought a lot of fine horses to the Province and it is doubtful if any one of them has the high quality of this last addition. He is a grand-son of Peter the Great, the world's greatest sire.

The followers of sport in this Province will be interested to learn that the very popular Dick C. 2.14 1/2, so successfully campaigned here last year, met with defeat in a match race in Cape Breton recently. His former owner cannot understand why he should lose as Dick C. possessed terrific speed. He was very delicately balanced, however, only 8 oz. shoes. His feet had to be kept in very short and his head checked at the right angle otherwise he would mix a little into a trot. It may be that balanced for sea racing, this could not be done, hence his defeat.

Followers of horse racing, who have made a study of it, will be interested to learn that Mr. L. R. Acker, the theatrical magnate is going to campaign through the Maritime Provinces Mr. Acker has a string of horses which have cost him \$8,000 and they are all crack-bricks. He is one of the best bred horses living and has perfect racing manners.

**German Criticise French Government**

BERLIN, Mar. 17.—The French charge D'Affaires protested on behalf of the French government to a speech delivered by Major General Von Seeht, one of the German reparations delegation, in giving his impressions of the London conference to officials of the Ministry of Defence on March 13th. In the speech referred to General Von Seeht said that at Spa and Versailles the French and Belgians had treated the German delegates like kaffirs, but in London the British attitude had been in every way correct. The breaking up of the conference he attributed entirely to Premier Briand and M. Loucheur of the French delegation.
