**New Theatre
For New York**

(Canadian Press.)
NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—Otto H. Kahn, the financier who helped Morris Gest bring the U. S. stage the Russian Ballet, the Moscow Art Theater and The Miracle, will be one of the chief investors in a new duplex "spectacle theater," to be erected on 42nd Street, near Times Square within a year. Mr. Gest has announced.

Mr. Gest declined to reveal the site chosen for the theater, pending the completion of the purchase. He disclosed, however, that Mr. Kahn would put \$250,000 into the enterprise; that the theater would be used to stage such massive productions as The Miracle which hitherto have not been brought to America; that two plays had been obtained for simultaneous production at the opening of the place; and that Max Reinhardt, the European director, probably would be in charge of the casting.

The new building, said Mr. Gest, "will be like a big marble barn," minus all the ornate interior, decoration of the usual theater, and so arrayed that a new interior and stage can be constructed within it, to conform to each successive spectacle produced. It will be especially fitted for plays in which the stage and auditorium are one, with actors mingling with the audience.

Above the main theater will be a smaller secondary one, equipped for chamber productions.
