CAME EAST ON A VISIT. — This week Mr. Dunbar of this city discovered in his ranch at Keppoch a strange fox. On examination he found that the animal had the ear mark of Mr. Urban Gillis' foxes at Miscouche. Mr. Dunbar wrote Mr. Gillis asking if he had sold the fox to any parties near Charlottetown. Mr. Gillis quickly telephoned back that two foxes escaped from his ranch the day before. It is quite evident that the animal referred to had walked from Summerside—a distance of 40 miles, in twenty-four hours, and being hungry and lonesome, or both, had walked over the guard fence from the snow banks, and joined his confreres at Keppoch. Other fox tracks were seen outside the Keppoch ranch, giving rise to the theory that the other missing animal is also trying to find its way in to Mr. Dunbar's ranch.

AT GOVERNOR'S ISLAND. — Drilling operations at Governor's Island have been suspended for the present owing to one of those interruptions which are quite common in activities of that kind. As already stated the 12 1/2 inch casing had been set when the drill reached the depth of 225 feet. When they started to drill below this point the bottom of the pipe crumpled up, making it impossible to lift the tools out of the pipe. The steel cable was then cut off close to the top of the tool. The bottom joints of the casing will be cut out, the string of casing removed from the hole, and then the work of fishing out. Manager Stuntz believes that the trouble was probably caused by a faulty weld in the casing. He does not think that there was sufficient pressure of salt water to cause a collapse of the casing. The necessary equipment is on the ground for lifting the string of casing which weighs 35 tons, and unscrewing it apart, joint by joint as it is drawn above the surface. Once the tools are removed the drilling will be resumed as usual. As some special tools will have to be secured to carry on the fishing in the bottom of the 1335 hole, drilling operations will have to be suspended for a week or ten days; but in the meantime the men will be employed in transporting from Charlottetown to the Island about 3,500 feet of 8 inch casing.

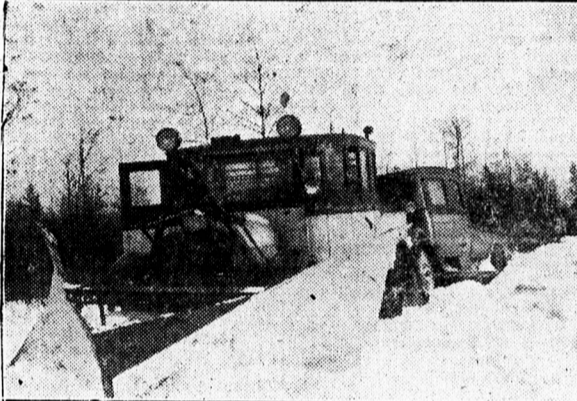
