CAPE BRETON MAN IN TROUBLE AT ST. JOHN.
 ST. JOHN, April 29.—A young man who gave his name as James A. Wilcox, of Cape Breton was arrested at the Royal Hotel, here, tonight on a forgery charge. Early today he registered at the Royal as D. R. Kerr of Halifax, and soon after it is alleged that he went into the up-town branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia and presented a draft which the manager refused to pay without it being endorsed. Wilcox said he could easily get it endorsed and soon after came back with the name of J. H. Bond written across the back of the draft. The clerk called up Mr. Bond who said that he had never seen the man. In the meantime Wilcox had left the bank.
 At six o'clock he handed T. Reynolds, manager of the Royal a check for \$50 signed by Brock and Paterson, per J. Paterson. After endorsing it at the hotel desk, he wanted it cashed. Reynolds refused, but gave him \$15 on spec. Later he discovered that the draft had been endorsed "H. R. McCready, Halifax." When Wilcox came in Reynolds accused him of forgery, and Reynolds says he admitted his action, and asked the hotel man to keep it quiet, at the same time returning the \$15 Reynolds's however, called Detective Killeen and had the man arrested. Wilcox is young, and rather good looking.

 ...A large number of Masons from Montague attended the funeral of the late Captain Ronald McLean of the Caledonia on Monday. The services were conducted by that Order, of which the Captain was a member.—M.
 ...James McKarney of St. Mary's Road who had been doing quite a business in the woods along the Lower Montague during this week had his gasoline engine broken down yesterday but with the mechanical skill of Isaac Ives and Herb Poole of Montague, Mr. McKarney had it repaired quickly.
 ...H. S. Wansbater, representing James Carstairs & Co. and Clarence W. Harris representing Vess & Co. are at the McDonald Hotel, Montague. Saturday afternoon they both abandoned the grip and took to the basket and for a while became fish peddlers. These two gentlemen thought they would try their hand at the fishing game and went up the Montague river almost a mile. Their luck was such that in less than two hours they were back with a large basket full of trout, some of them weighing 18 ounces. It took them nearly as long to distribute their fish among their many friends at Montague as it did to catch them. It was a pleasant surprise to several people who came to their doors in answer to a ring to find two strangers offering a dish of splendid beauties without money and with out price. This has none of the exaggeration generally found in connection with fisheries for your correspondent who came in for eight pounds can vouch for it being the best catch of trout made at Montague for several years.
 ...Members of the Independent Order of Foresters, to which McKenzie belonged, came next and then there were other mourners in carriages. In one vehicle the city council of Vancouver was represented by His Worship Mayor Findlay and Aldermen Trimble, Bright and Woodside. The band of the Salvation Army brought up the rear.
 The funeral service held in the fire hall was extremely impressive. The Rev. R. J. Wilson and Rev. J.A. Logan conducted the Presbyterian ceremony. The building was strikingly decorated with black cloth and was filled to its utmost capacity by a large crowd of mourners. Several thousand more stood outside awaiting the cortege to proceed from the fire hall to the depot.
 In accordance with the usual custom prevailing at the funeral of a Presbyterian, the mourners at one part of the service sang the beautiful hymn, "Rock of Ages, cleft for me," and at the end lifted their voices to join in "Nearer My God to Thee." After this the casket was opened and nearly all looked around the coffin to take a last look at the face of the dead.
 The service concluded, the coffin was once more borne to the hose wagon and the procession again formed up in the same order as on the journey from the undertakers to the fire hall. The procession, accompanied by the band playing the funeral dirges, wended its way from Gore Avenue to Main Street and thence along Hastings Street to the railway depot, which was reached about 6 o'clock.
 The casket was then taken from the wagon and put in a special shipping case, a detachment of firemen standing guard over it on the platform until the transcontinental train pulled out for the east at 7:30 o'clock. The body was placed on the train, the three sisters and a fireman accompanying the remains. The body will be interred in the family vault at Charlottetown.
 As already published the remains of the unfortunate fireman arrived in Charlottetown last week and were conveyed to his father's residence at Flat River from which the funeral took place on Thursday afternoon to the cemetery of St. John's Church, Belfast. The pall-bearers were: Alex. D. Ross, Neil Robert Martin, Angus MacRae, Frederick MacKensie, John Riley and Hector MacKensie. The great sympathy of the community in which he was born and of the surrounding country was evidenced by
