HALF MAN, HALF METAL
Canadian Bridgeworker Greatest Piece of Human Patchwork in the World

That a man’s mangled body could be patched up with nearly half a hundred weight of metal, and the man still be able to take some enjoyment out of life, might seem an absurd statement, but James Thompson came back to Montreal from a New York hospital carrying forty two pounds of iron, steel and other metals worked into his anatomy. He is probably the only man in the world who can say that he is strong and alive after having lost the majority of his joints and eight major bones.

Thompson was in a bad plight when he fell from a span of the Quebec bridge, on which he was working three days previous to the collapse of the structure. He dropped over two hundred feet into the river, and when rescued was found to have every major bone in his body broken. So the unconscious workman was hustled on to New York to be used for experimental purposes at St. Luke’s Hospital. The house surgeons there took charge of him and proceeded to patch him up. After three years he came back to Canada, looking for a job.

In his head is a gold plate larger than a silver dollar; between his ribs are special steel girders; his elbows are of steel; six feet of new bone has been grafted into the legs and arm. A steel bar holds his head erect, but prevents it from turning.

Mr. Thompson was offered big money to go on the stage, but refused. Several famous museums applied for his body “post mortem,” and he consented to be embalmed and placed in the British Museum when death comes his way.

DARING COSSACK MAID
Enrolled a Regiment of Men Hoping to Invade Persia

Mrs. Poltyjaeff, a good looking young Cossack woman of South Russia was frustrated in her plans to take a Cossack regiment into Persia.

Having collected her men—all young Cossacks who knew how to shoot and fight—she wrote a letter to the local Ataman, or Cossack chief, for a passport to leave the country, saying: “As a Cossack born and bred I can no longer bear the disorder that reigns in Persia and therefore have raised a regiment of Cossacks to go and put down the anarchy there. I hope you will allow us to march as soon as possible.”

Her disappointment was intense when the Ataman refused her request, saying that there would be international complications if she invaded Persia. But he showed much sympathy with her true Cossack spirit. She continued drilling her men in hope of being allowed to go at a later date. When drilling she wears short skirts and a conical fur cap.

She is a crack shot and can ride as well as any Cossack in the Czar’s army, knowing also the trick of riding when lashed to the horse’s girth—a good way of entering the enemy’s lines unseen. She can ride head down, bareback or any other way, which is not surprising, as she belongs to the best riders in the world. Her age is twenty-three and her religion Mohammedan-Tartar. All her life she has lived in a tent and thinks koumiss (fermented donkey milk) the greatest delicacy in the world.

MACEDONIAN CUSTOMS
No One Washes in Cold Water and Rotten Pears a Delicacy

The hospitality of the Macedonian householder is extended to any stranger or traveller, according to Mrs. Herbert Vivian, who published an account of her journeyings through that country in a London paper. During a long tour of Macedonia, Mrs. Vivian only stayed in one hotel, being at other times most cordially received in one house or another.

“I have a vivid recollection,” she wrote, “of a visit to an Archdeacon of the Orthodox Church in a town thirty miles from Uskub. The little house was charming, with a gay smiling garden, but it was guarded like a fortress. High walls surrounded the place, and huge barred gates were closed every night with a pomp and ceremony. The ground floor was used as a granary, and the living and sleeping rooms are approached by a ladder which led to a balcony. In this balcony was a trap door, and when one got safely through it was let down and bolted.

“Next to the big room, with practically no furniture, was a wooden bench running the whole way, and near the ceiling a shelf ornamented with bowls and cups. All day I wondered where I was going to sleep, but at night time the Archdeacon’s sister appeared with long, long tresses which she strung on the benches, and by signs made me understand this was my bed. I felt very travel-stained and dirty, and finally made my hostess understand I wanted a wash. She returned bearing a curious old pewter ewer and basin and insisted on washing my hands whilst I held them out. No one in the Balkans will wash in still water, and it is a special attention when your hostess insists on acting as maid.

“Next morning we were up with the ark, for if you are not down by six o’clock you are considered a terrible sluggard. In the sitting-room our hostess first provided us with Slatic, a thick, syrupy preserve, and presently with cups of Turkish coffee, offering us as large as time glasses of plum brandy. In about half an hour a table-cloth made its appearance, and soon we were all sitting round the table whilst she ladled out cups of hot milk, to which she added small portions of Turkish coffee. No one is to be seen till the middle of the day, but there is a sort of spread with chopped onions and thin slices of cheese.

“One of my most interesting visits was to the Abbot of a Mohammedan monastery in Albanian Macedonia. The abbot’s table and charming digressive conversation, the most fascinating labour, and allowed me to take his photograph sitting cross-legged behind his coffee table. He regaled us with the biggest peaches I have ever seen, bunches of grapes as large as those of the Promised Land and homegrown tobacco. In the Balkans the supreme mark of devotion is to present your guest with a rotten pear. It must not only be sleepy, it must be absolutely snoring. An attentive host will nurse a pear for weeks before bringing it to the desired state of excellence.

“Picnics are favorite entertainments, and parties are made up to visit monasteries on fete days, where every peasant is in the brightest array with gaudy ducats and covered with gorgeous embroidery. The meal, almost invariably consists of suckling pig roasted whole over the embers.”

LUNACY IN LONDON

Interesting details as to the number of lunatics in London and the causes of insanity are contained in the report of the Asylums Committee of the London County Council.

In London’s ten asylums according to the report, there were 30,429 lunatics. Of 8,000 patients admitted during the fiscal year 800 are classified as hereditary lunatics. Another 300 come under the category of “alcoholic hereditary,” whilst 700 drank themselves insane. Privation and starvation made eighty-four mad.

A table as to the occupation of patients shows that insanity is more prevalent amongst those who work with their hands than with those who use their brains. Of 1,700 women admitted 442 were domestic workers and 934 of no occupation, these latter including housewives. There were 166 in the “dress” industry. Only forty-six women placed under “professional occupations” could be said to be brain workers, all the others being persons whose occupations were of a manual nature. With the men the facts were almost the same.
