Plums were in good supply at 7.8c per qt also apples which sold from 10-15c per pk.
Butter remains from 22-24c per lb and eggs per dozen at 18-19c.

Poultry was more plentiful, chickens selling from 50-65c per pair and geese from 80-90c each.
Hay loose per cwt sold from 65-75c, pressed \$13.50. Oats per bushel brought 37-38.
Potatoes per bushel, sold from 20-25 and turnips 12-16c.

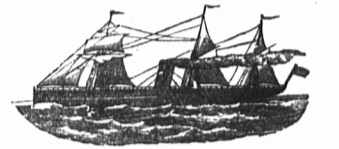
