German Infantry, Say Britishers Always Advanced in Heavy Formation

MOWED DOWN BY GUNS

British Losses Were Severe, but Enemy were Slaughtered in Thousands

LONDON, Sept. 2.—The British public has been reassured by the statement from Field Marshal, Sir John French that the British army is in good condition and spirits and has been reinforced by twice as many men as were lost during the four days' battle and retreat, and is ready to meet the enemy again.

AWAITS CASUALTY LIST PATIENTLY.

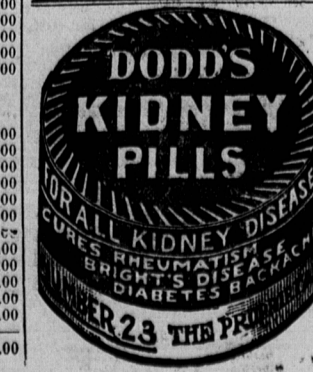
