SAD HUNTING TRAGEDY HERE YESTERDAY

Nazi Bombing Planes Driven Off By Ships

Chamberlain Indicates Britain's War Policy Unchanged—Military Circles See Possibility Of Mass Enemy Attack.

(By J. F. Sanderson, Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, Oct. 9.—(CP Cable)—The Royal Navy repulsed repeated attacks by German bombing planes in the North Sea today without damage to any British ship. A laconic statement from the Admiralty said that only sudden darkness allowed a German naval squadron to escape from British patrol craft Sunday off the Norwegian coast, while today "repeated actions have taken place in the northeastern areas of the North Sea between German bombing aircraft and British cruisers and destroyers."

The Admiralty's statement, after noting there had been no damage to British ships, added that "casualties to the enemy (planes) are not known." Meanwhile Britain maintained her unyielding stand against Adolf Hitler's "peace terms" while military circles suggested the German High Command might launch a mass attack on the western front by striking through Belgium or Luxembourg.

The Prime Minister is expected to make his official reply to the Hitler proposals when he speaks to the House on Wednesday. "One may respect or hate Hitlerism or any other system of political opinions. This is a matter of taste. But to begin a war for the extermination of Hitlerism means to admit to criminal silliness in policy."

LOCAL MAN SUCCUMBS TO INJURIES

Eugene Ward, 34, Of This City Fatally Injured At Victoria Yesterday Morning. Eugene Ward, 34-year-old Charlottetown man died in the P. E. I. Hospital at 5:30 yesterday evening from a gun shot wound in the leg. He was injured near Victoria early yesterday morning while hunting with three companions, Gerald Acorn, Archie Bruce and Leslie Gillespie, all of this city. The accident occurred when Acorn's gun was accidentally discharged as he was climbing through a fence, the charge entering Ward's leg below the knee. His wound was tied up and he was driven to Crapaud, several miles away, where he received medical aid from Dr. Boyver before being taken to hospital here.

At first it was believed he had a good chance for recovery but late in the afternoon his condition became more serious and despite all efforts to save him, he finally succumbed to his injuries. Coroner Dr. I. J. Yeo said last night that at present it is unnecessary as it was an accidental shooting. Mr. Ward was at one time on the staff of the Guardian and at present is a mechanic at Martin's Garage here. He is married and has a family of two children. His wife was formerly Margaret MacLeod of this city. His oldest child, Eugene Jr. is 10 years old and the baby, Jessie Mae is 14 months. Besides his wife and children he is survived by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Ward, both of Charlottetown, and the following brothers: Roy and Elmer, on the staff of the Sydney Post-Record, Sydney, N. S.; Lewis, with the Signalers at Sydney, Cecil, on the staff of the Charlottetown Guardian, Chester, Stanley and Ira, all of Charlottetown, and one sister, Grace (Mrs. James Collier) also of this city.

Hot Fighting On Wide Front Is Official Report

Unknown Whether New Activity Fortells Long Expected German Offensive Changed Enemy Tactics Seen As Possible Answer. (By Taylor Henry, Associated Press Staff Writer) PARIS, Oct. 9.—(AP)—The French high command reported tonight that the Germans were attacking all the way from the Moselle River to Saarbruecken on the most extensive front brought into simultaneous action since the war started five weeks ago. Besides the fighting on the 35-mile front, the night communique said an artillery duel covered the entire northern flank of the western front, from the Moselle to Lauterbourg, where the French-German frontier joins the Rhine. The communique also declared a French submarine attacked "an enemy submarine with success." Shells screamed overhead as German patrols extended their contact with French advance guards from near the Luxembourg border to Saarbruecken, central key of Nazi defences between the Moselle and the Rhine. The German attacks have been increasing in strength daily. French official reports of the last few days have told of repulsing German patrols in surprise attacks against various sectors.

Tonight the communique said there was "very great activity of enemy patrols between the Moselle and the Saar." The Germans were believed to be throwing larger and larger units into the fighting. Military observers reported 24 hours ago that the Germans were using units as large as companies, supported by machine gun and anti-tank units, for their advance patrol work.

French observers considered it too early to say whether the long expected offensive was yet under way but the communique left little doubt that one of the heaviest actions of the war to date was in progress. French and British scouting planes were endeavoring to verify reports of German troop dispositions in order to determine the significance of the increasing German activity.

(British officials announced four of their planes made a scouting flight along the German frontier from France to the North Sea.) Changed tactics of German artillery caused some French observers to believe a limited German offensive might be starting. German batteries for the first time began trying to silence French artillery just behind the front lines. This counter-battery work during

F.W.I. Promises Aid In Canada's War Efforts

EDMONTON, Oct. 9.—Cooperation and assistance of the 75,000 members of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada in any war effort was offered here today at the opening session of the four-day biennial convention. Delegates voted to send resolutions to Prime Minister Mackenzie King and Neville Chamberlain of Great Britain offering to serve how, when and where they are directed by those in authority. Mrs. Alfred Watt, O. B. E., of London, England, president of the associated country women of the world, said her organization had made an effort to prevent outbreak of war and was determined to remain friendly with women of enemy countries "no matter what happens." "Good comes out of evil and the doors may be opened for wider services of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada," added Mrs. Watt, former resident of Ontario. Mrs. Watt suggested making apple juice a "national drink" to use the apple surplus caused by hostilities. She stated the institute might study nutrition and food substitutes as important war problems.

LAPOINTE SAYS QUE. ELECTION IS SABOTAGE

Will Resign In Event Of A Duplessis Win Justice Minister Declares. OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—(CP)—The Quebec provincial election is "an act of national sabotage, and already the methods of gangsters are in use," Rt. Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Federal Minister of Justice, said tonight as with a radio address, originating in Ottawa, and broadcast over a chain of Quebec stations, he entered the campaign against the Union Nationale Government. Mr. Lapointe said that a victory for the Quebec Government, headed by Maurice Duplessis, would be his cue, and that of the other Quebec ministers, to retire from the Federal Government. "I would be expected to remain in the cabinet in spite of Quebec's wishes," he said. "I repeat it. If the people of the Province prove by their votes that they believe the atrocious calumnies and the shameful lies which are the basis and substance of Mr. Duplessis' campaign, how could we be expected to continue to represent them and to speak in their name at the council of the nation? I leave to my Quebec fellow-countrymen the responsibility of this important decision and I will accept it." "But I have faith in my province. I am confident that it will not render a verdict that will be acclaimed in Berlin and Moscow on election night. Nazi and Communist agents have stirred up discussion in all the countries of America. Quebec will not allow itself to be influenced by such propaganda." "By your verdict I will abide," Mr. Lapointe concluded his address.

Finney, Secretary of the Council, said that the meeting "to consider the further development of the stand he has taken in recent speeches and articles on the war situation."

Speculation On Large Scale Air Operations

ESBJERG, Denmark, Oct. 9.—Forced landings by two German warplanes at almost the same time in the same region caused speculation today on the possibility that large scale air operations have been in progress over the North Sea. The impression that an extensive engagement had taken place was heightened when it was reported Danish anti-aircraft guns at Aabenraa, near the German border, fired at a German fighting plane seen over Danish territory, and drove it off. A two-motored German plane was damaged in a forced landing off the island of Fanoe near here. One of its four crewmen was injured slightly. Another two-motored German ship, also carrying four men, ran out of gasoline and landed at Nymdebag, some 25 miles north of here at 5 p. m. All were interned.

NAZIS HOPE TO STRENGTHEN HOME POSITION

Still Seek Early End To War Hitler Started By Invasion of Poland. (By Melvin K. Whiteleather) BERLIN, Oct. 9.—(AP)—The Nazi Government had three lines out tonight in Europe's diplomatic negotiations, which they hoped would strengthen their position at home and bring to an early end the war Adolf Hitler started when his legions invaded Poland five weeks ago.

These lines were: 1. Negotiations with Moscow for quick delivery of raw materials. 2. Starting of an elaborate plan to repatriate hundreds of thousands of Germans living in eastern and northern Europe. 3. Encouraging of neutrals to take the lead in forming a peace bloc for halting the war. The Army High Command in a communique reported only minor activity on the western front and continued cleaning up of Poland. The emphasis Nazis placed on the possibility of receiving raw materials from Soviet Russia was brought out in tonight's press in connection with opening of negotiations in Moscow by a German trade mission. Newspaper headlines reported "immediate deliveries" were to be

RUSSIA BACKS GERMANY IN PEACE PLAN

Continues Moves To Consolidate Position In Baltic—Negotiations With Turkey At Standstill. MOSCOW, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Soviet Russia backed Germany tonight in her drive for peace in Europe and at the same time sought to consolidate her military, territorial and economic gains in a diplomatic chain stretching from the Baltic to the Black Sea. In the first comment to appear in Russia on Adolf Hitler's Reichstag speech of Friday, the government newspaper Izvestia, made a demand for peace on the basis of Hitler's terms, which the paper called "real" and "practical," and attacked Great Britain and France. Izvestia accused the Allies of "returning to the middle ages" in waging war to "exterminate Hitlerism."

Condition Of A. E. MacLean Said Weaker

BOSTON, Oct. 9.—(CP)—A. E. MacLean, 71-year-old Liberal member of the Canadian House of Commons for Prince (P. E. I.), was reported by hospital authorities today as growing weaker. He has been undergoing treatment here for some months.
