Inside the market building eggs were sold at 40 cents per dozen, butter 30 cents a pound and chicken and fowl from \$1. to \$1.50. Outside the market there was also a poor attendance of butchers offering beef for sale at from 8 to 9 1/2 cents per pound.

SUPREME COURT. - The Hilary term of the Supreme Court yesterday resumed, and the case of Horne v. McAdyen, on promissory notes, was continued before Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and a jury. Mr. McKinnon, for the defendant, addressed the Lordship. The case is still before the court. Counsel: Stewart, K. C., for plaintiff; McKinnon, K. C., defendant.

BAD ROADS. - Mr. J. Stanley Wedlock, who recently returned to the city from scouring the country in the interests of the fox business, told a Guardian representative yesterday, regarding the condition of the roads in the country, that "they are very bad in all parts of the country. Though it is practically to drive a light sleigh on them there is no going for heavy horses and it is impossible to move heavy loads, while, to add to the difficulties, pitches are being made everywhere."

N. S. INDUSTRIAL ASCENDENCY. - The Guardian has received a copy of a beautifully illustrated brochure issued by the Nova Scotia Branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association. The book is entitled "The Industrial Ascendancy of Nova Scotia" and shows, mainly by illustrations, the present position of the manufacturing industries of Nova Scotia. The cover presents a stirring scene along the water front of a giant industry. Following this are 53 pages of exceedingly attractive views of Nova Scotian manufacturing. Special write-ups of the principal manufacturing industries are given and also short illustrated descriptions of the basic industries of agriculture, fishing, lumbering and coal mining. The briefest glance through the pages reveals an unexpected wealth of industrial activity in that province. This picture story shows that Nova Scotia is conspicuously a great work shop of the Dominion. There are now 1,400 manufacturing in the Province, paying out eleven million dollars in wages to 29,000 employees. These reviews indicate that Nova Scotia is destined for a prominent manufacturing career, and that it would be hazardous to limit the extent to which its economic wealth is capable of being exploited. The book is interesting not only by its portrayal of the progress already made, but also by its delineation of the further possibilities of that Province as a manufacturing field. RADIUM IS CURE FOR LOST VOICE.

In the current issue of "The Post-Graduate" Dr. Thomas J. Harris, of the New York Post Graduate Medical School and Hospital, discussing "Radium in the Treatment of Multiple Papilloma of the Larynx," contributes the following evidence to the efficacy of the wonderful mineral as a curative agent. Dr. Harris says that he "confidently believes" that in radium there is a remedy for growths that impair the voice.

Referring to specific cases, Dr. Harris tells of six patients of Dr. Robert Abbe and Dr. Wolff Freudenthal treated with radium. In one case, that of a woman, repeated operations failed to restore the voice, but in February, 1907, twenty milligrams of radium was applied. The growth, with the exception of a minute remnant in the anterior commissure, disappeared. On account of the irritability of the throat the radium could be applied for only two or three minutes at a time, a total of twenty minutes.

The following January she reported that she could talk loudly again. Two years later a small bit of growth could be seen on the right cord. At present she talks loudly and plainly. The attending laryngologist had one snipped off a little bit of growth, but he regards the case as practically cured. This, as far as we know, is the first case of papilloma of the larynx treated by radium.

Similar results are reported in several other like cases. "This report represents thirteen cases treated by radium. All the authorities are agreed upon the entire freedom from reaction or other unpleasant results attending its application. Its mode of

UNUSUALLY BRISK. - Though this period of the year is as a rule quiet in the fox business, this year it has been exceptionally brisk, according to Mr. Chester McLure, of the Fur Farmers' Bureau. He told a Guardian reporter yesterday: "We have exceeded our expectations this year, business being extra good. Of course, practically all our business is outside business. We feel that the field in this province has already been thoroughly covered in regard to investments in the industry and so we are putting our energies into the securing of outside business."

CARNIVAL. - The Arena Rink, ice space and promenade, was crowded last night, with people at the second carnival of the season. The ice was perfect, the music excellent and consequently everybody had a good time. The varied costumes of the skaters were well conceived and very mirth-provoking. Conspicuous was the representation of a donkey by four skaters. In the form of the animal they represented they skated around the rink kicking up their heels and doing many similar antics which brought forth much laughter.

STEAMERS. - The Earl Grey left Pictou at 10.15 Tuesday morning with 3 tons freight, 150 sacks mail, and 30 passengers, and till late in the afternoon was battling with the heavily packed ice in Pictou Harbor, making very slow progress, but on reaching this side of Pictou light found clear water and made Georgetown at 1.20 p. m. The Minto, which had been in the ice off Pictou Harbor since Monday morning, reached the open stretch of water shortly before the Earl Grey and docked at Georgetown at 3.15. She had on board 16 tons freight, 14 tons express, 70 sacks of mail and 7 p. s. passengers. A special mail train from Charlottetown was waiting at Georgetown and as soon as the cargo from the boats were put aboard left for Charlottetown, reaching here at 7.15 p. m. This morning the Earl Grey will leave Georgetown for Pictou at 7 o'clock taking all the mails, freight and passengers for the mainland, conveyed to Georgetown by a special train which left the city at 8.45 last night.

MAPLE SUGAR FUDGE

Ten ounces of mable sugar, one tablespoonful of butter, pinch of cream of tartar, three heaping tablespoonfuls of fondant, one cupful of cream, half teaspoonful of almond extract. Put into a saucepan the sugar, cream and butter, and dissolve very carefully, stirring all the time, as the cream readily scorches. Boil to 238 degrees, then set the pan on table, and stir in the fondant, and almond extract. When thoroughly mixed and turning creamy pour into a buttered tin. When nearly firm, cut in neat squares.
