ICELAND SHIPPING COD TO THE AMERICAN FISH MARKETS. HALIFAX, April 1.—That Iceland may become a lively competitor in sending codfish to the American markets is predicted by the St. John's, Nfld., Trade Review, which referring to the monster fare landed at New England ports last fall says: "We get a startling realization of the fact that distance between producer and consumer no longer counts, as far as ocean freightings is concerned, when we are told that Iceland sent a cargo of one and a half million pounds of codfish to the United States last fall—the largest cargo by the way that ever entered New England. The European countries farther south, owing to war conditions in the North Sea, ried this venture to the United States, and we understand is paid them well. Having got a taste of a good thing, they are not likely to neglect the 'United States' market, even after the close of the war. Iceland is likely to become a permanent competitor with Newfoundland and Canada for the United States market in years to come.
