By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, March 18.—David (Sweeney) Schriner of Calgary, taken dubiously into the creaking New York American machine last fall when Joe Simpson was inclined to welcome all-comers under the age of 30 or so, quickly established himself the National Hockey League's best rookie of the season.

Voting in connection with the annual Canadian Press all-star poll, the writers had no hesitation placing him at the head of a freshman group that included some of the best rookies the N. H. L. has looked on in some years—Bert Connolly, Lynn Patrick and Charlie Mason of the Rangers, Pep Kelly of Toronto, Nels Crutchfield and Jack McGill of Canadiens, just to mention a few.

Succeeds Blinco He succeeds Russ Blinco of Montreal, named the best rookie of the 1933-34 season and Carl Voss, then of Detroit Red Wings, and now of St. Louis, who won the poll the previous year. Schriner's first-year record reads better than those of either Voss or Blinco, both centre players.

Of 27 newspaper critics who took part in the vote, 26 called the smooth-haired left winger of the lowly Americans the outstanding rookie. The other named Bill Miller, former Montreal Hawk who broke in after mid-season with Montreal Maroons and was an immediate success.

Connolly, also a graduate of the Mopetun Allan Cup camp, placed second in the poll. He received nine second-choice votes and four third-choice. Crutchfield, ace of the McGill University team last season, was third. His name was written four times as second choice and twice as third-choice.

Conspicuous Success Lester Patrick's son, a conspicuous success on his father's team; Toronto's Pap Kelly, straight from the St. Michael's College junior team of 1934; Bill Cowley of Ottawa and Pete Kelly of Charlottetown, who signed with St. Louis Eagles, were others prominently mentioned.

All these made the jump straight from amateur company, but Schriner went to the Americans equipped with one year's experience in the international league. He last played as an amateur with Calgary Blonks in 1933.

Valuable Player That was a sign the Americans owned a valuable player, but it was no indication he was going to step into the N. H. L. and accumulate 40 points in his first season. His record is 18 goals and 22 assists. He is fourth among Canadian section scoring leaders.

Not since Charlie Conacher signalled his big pond entry by bagging 20 goals in the 1929-30 season has a rookie created such a splash. Connolly and Patrick each have scored nine goals and 11 assists and Pep Kelly's average shows 10 goals and seven assists.

BUFFALO CLUB OWNER LAYS CHARGES

Claims Bisons Were Ousted From Playoff in "Deal" Between Syracuse and Cleveland.

By Nelson Griswold Associated Press Staff Writer (By Guardian's Special Wire) BUFFALO, N. Y., March 18.—International Hockey League leaders pondered tonight the charge of Frank B. Baird Jr., owner of the Buffalo Club, that Cleveland and Syracuse staged their 13-7 scoring spree Sunday night to keep the Bisons from the championship series that opens tomorrow.

Baird declared the game, which Syracuse won, was an obvious "deal." He stated he was "determined not to be associated with a sport where such a spectacle is countenanced."

The Bisons owner denied in a telegram to Charles S. King, owner of the Windsor team and President of the League, that Cleveland and Syracuse were dropped from the circuit or Buffalo would withdraw. His telegram followed a conference with attorneys early this afternoon.

Baird accused the Syracuse team of lying back along Cleveland to save its skin in the last period of their game.

Previous to the battle, Cleveland and Buffalo were tied for third. The victory brought Syracuse into the deadlock and total goals for the season determined the final standing as well as the playoff entrants.

Before the Syracuse-Cleveland game, Buffalo was leading Cleveland in total goals, 113-108. The Falcons' seven goals Sunday, however, gave them a two-goal edge over the Bisons and higher ranking in the standing.

Harry Holmes, manager of the Cleveland team, denied in a telephone conversation that there was anything unethical about the Sunday game.

"We just needed goals, and went out and got them with five forwards," he said. He referred to the Cleveland surge in the final period that netted six goals in the space of eight minutes.

Withdrawal of Buffalo, which played all of its home games at Fort Erie, Ont., would leave only five teams in the circuit.

A dull and uninteresting game of hockey was played in Bradalbane March 15th between the Freetown Maple Leafs, winners of the Simmons-MacFarlane Trophy, and the Bradalbane hockey team. The game was dull with bits of fast hockey throughout.

YANKEES STRONGER WITHOUT RUTH?

New York Ball Club Has Host of Stars to Carry On.

PETERSBURG, Fla., March 18.—Now that Babe Ruth, in Boston and they're just another ball club from New York, the Yankees are starting life all over again as a unit in the American League race. The prospect is anything but bright—for the opposition.

In the glare of Ruth the iron man majesty of the even-going slugging Lou Gehrig paled, even stars as great as "Lefty" Gomez, Bill Dickey, Earl Combs, swift Ben Chapman and burly Red Ruffing couldn't fight their way out of the background.

Gehrig is set to continue his tremendous iron man streak at first base, aiming for home run honors and a boost in his life-time major league hitting record that stands at .345 over better than 10 years. Tony Lazzari, only other infield veteran of the 1932 champions, is still a fine second baseman Frank Crosetti is a fixture at short and "Red" Ruff, the Dartmouth Alumnaus and potential ace, is strongly rooted on third.

The pitching staff is the thing that has the rest of the American League managers shaking their heads. Gomez and Ruffing won 45 games between them last season. Johnny Broaca and Jimmy DeShong are brilliant youngsters, certain starters. There's still some question as to the comeback ability of Johnny Allen and southpaw Russ Van Atta, 1934 disappointments, but there's still the massive Walter Brown, up from Newark and sure to stick and Vito Tamulis, young Boston southpaw who finished brilliantly with the Yanks last fall.
