

Favorites Beaten In Great Racing Card At Montague Track

Favorites fell like ten-pins at the Montague harness racing meeting yesterday afternoon as a crowd estimated at over 2500 saw sensational duels of speed in each and every one of the 17 heats on the program; saw horses take new win records and as a climax to practically every heat witnessed six and seven horses battle it out over the entire mile so closely packed that a blanket could have covered them all.

Prince Budlong, Rosalie Hooper, Lucky Number, New Look, Valley Long and Abegetw Milady were the winners, with Lucky Number and New Look coming through with the only straight heat victories of the afternoon, the latter pacing off with the No. 5 event, winning the second elimination mile and then repeating the performance in the final.

Rosalie Hooper, pacing a storm, lowered her record to 2:13 1/5 in the first heat of No. 2 Classified and then further lowered it to 2:18 1/5 in the second heat, while Valley Long in the last heat of the day lowered his mark to 2:15.

Once again the officials came through with capable performances, Russell Abbott doing a fine job as starter while presiding judge F. R. McLaine's description of the heats aided the fans greatly in following the stirring duels that were taking place on almost every part of the track.

No. 1 Classified
Billy McVey, a favorite with the bettors, made every post a winning one as he paced off with the first heat, beating off chief rivals of Quick Lick and Molly Bars in the first three-quarters of the mile and then Prince Budlong's closing stretch drive, but it was a different story in the next two heats.

Prince Budlong, making his first start since an injury suffered in 1947, showed he has retained his top form when he outpaced the favorite in the second heat, being headed by Ola Budlong in the final mile. The field of seven were packed like sardines as they hit the three-quarter pole the first mile and as they came under the wire five were strung out in a line across the track. A photo was necessary to decide matters and it showed Rosalie in front with Kelly's Nightmare just a step behind, La Budlong, Babe Britton and Let's Budlong in that order, with Wait N' See and Lusia sixth and seventh.

Rosalie, trailing until they hit the top of the stretch in the sand-wich heat, pulled out with another burst of speed but it was very, very close for the next three positions with Ola Budlong getting the nod over the Nightmare and Lusia.

Ola made the grade in the third heat. She went away on top to make every post a winning one, having too much pace left for Rosalie as she challenged in the stretch.

No. 3 Classified
Willard Kelly won his second straight race with Lucky Number in a week when he won all three heats of the third event on the card. Six starters came to the wire and right to the top of the stretch the six of them raced in a tightly packed bunch. Hitting the stretch it was anybody's race but Lucky came terrifically fast in the last fifty yards to get his head in front at the wire.

The second and third miles produced two more stiff battles as Lucky Number came from behind in both cases to outpace the pack in the stretch. After the lead had changed several times in the first three quarters of the second mile Bee Budlong took over at the stretch but Lucky came fast in the last twenty yards to win by a

neck; in the final heat, in fifth position, put on a terrific burst of speed going to the backstretch the second trip around to pace to the front, but halfway down the stretch Lucky Number again corralled her to win by a length and complete his straight heat victory.

No. 4 Classified
Valley Long was the surprise package in this event, for after finishing sixth and eighth in the first two miles he came on to win the third heat, send the race into an extra mile and then capture the fourth and deciding heat in handy fashion from Buddy Budlong and Romeo, the other two heat winners.

As has been the case in the previous races the fans saw more thrill-packed duels in each heat of the event. Positions were changing rapidly all during the first mile until Romeo, pacing steadily all the way and driven by "Jiggy" Arbing, came through in the stretch to cop the heat in a close finish with Bonnie Dale and Buddy Budlong, a photo being necessary to split the second and third places.

Buddy Budlong paced into the picture in the second mile when he won a thrilling battle with Bonnie Dale, a photo showing him with a nose to the good as they flashed under the wire; and matters were further complicated as Valley Long came terrifically fast on the outside in the stretch to steal the heat right from Bonnie Dale at the wire. In the final mile there was no catching Valley as he led from wire to wire with Buddy second and Romeo third.

No. 5 Classified
The class was raced in elimination heats when eleven horses and geldings were sent to the first elimination mile, after the field of six had hammered away at each other New Look came tearing from behind at the three quarters to get the heat by a length over Calumet Onward and Maudine Budlong after the latter had led most of the way. Hilda Mac was fourth to complete the four eligible for the final mile.

In the second elimination mile it was Feather Duster who led the field home with Buck P. C. Grattan, Brendon's Boy and Donna Clegg completing the first four finishers.

Donna Clegg took the lead away for the final test but relinquished the lead to Feather Duster at the upper turn the first trip around. Positions remained unchanged until they hit the top of the backstretch the second time with Jimmy McGregor, driver-owner of New Look, taking his horse out and with a splendid display of reinsurance getting him to the front at the three quarter pole and then out-paced his challengers in the dash to the wire.

Dash Race
Abegetw Milady was the winner for four each, while Trailing New Money in the early part of the mile she took over the lead on the backstretch the first trip around as the leader went to a break and from there on made every post a winning one. Direct Volo came very fast the latter part of the mile to place second; Random Harvest was third with New Money a good fourth after making three skips during the race.

IN THE CORNER
Predicting earlier in the week in this column that the Wednesday racing card at the Montague track had all the possibilities of being outstanding meet, we were certainly close to the head of the mat as some 2,500 ardent racing fans thronged the stands and grounds to see some really thrilling races staged here by Manager George McIntyre.

Performing under ideal weather and track conditions, the horses seemed to send more than one driver and enthusiast of the crowd to give everything they had, producing some real blanket finishes which kept the crowd continually on its feet cheering for their favorite to come in, and if he didn't they had to admit that it was a good race anyway.

In addition to giving the fans the kind of close competitive racing they like to see, the horses and drivers were also taking advantage of the ideal conditions to further their mark and more than one driver piloted his trotter or pacer around the oval to clip records off their records.

Recovering from their last Sunday fiasco when they took a 16-0 drubbing from the Curran and Briggs nine, the Charlottetown Abegetw came back with a bang last evening to turn in a smart performance when they defeated the Summerside R.C.A.F. aggregation by a 7-5 count in a regular Island Baseball League fixture staged at Memorial Field.

The game was loosely played in spots, but this was overshadowed by some really snappy fielding and power hitting by both clubs, with a total of 20 hits rung up throughout the encounter, the locals garnering the lion's share with 12. In the fielding department, Buck Whitlock of Abbie's and Doc Lyon of the Airman, pulled the most spectacular plays of the game.

Whitlock, although having two errors chalked against him, figured in 10 other plays while Lyon made five nice catches in centre field. Vern Larter and Joey LeClair of Abbie's, wielding their clubs for three for four each, were the leading hitters, the former pounding out the only triple of the game in the seventh to bring home two men and put the game on ice for the local squad.

This being the horse racing season, the following article, which originated in Winnipeg, although carrying a slight bias, is of timely interest to horsemen generally.

Western horse owners are reportedly having difficulty in obtaining good accommodation for their horses in Eastern stables. The problem seemingly has been the same for years. John (Winnipeg) writes that the leading Eastern officials for treatment which, he says, over the years "has been anything but good."

He reports that Dan Kennedy's Oak Tree stud farm had difficulty getting stable room at Fort Erie, Ont., and other points on the Eastern Racing Circuit this summer. Kennedy has a stable of five two-year-olds, one four-year-old mare of good allowance class and a six-year-old handicapper horse.

"What with the two-year-olds developing and the two older horses coming into form, the stable is a good one for the Eastern Circuit because all the horses will fit the good class of race which is plentiful in the East," Sifton writes. He says that when Westerners ship to Toronto for the fall meetings they are usually stalled at Long Branch, a good distance away from the other three tracks in the City and well out of Central Toronto.

Skinner And Reed Win N. B. - P. E. I. Golf Titles

ST. ANDREW'S, N.B., July 6 (CP) — Archie Skinner, veteran professional of the host Algonquin Club, and Walter Reed Jr., Port Fairfield, Me., amateur, became New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island golf champions for the third time as the 16th annual 54-hole N.B.-P.E.I. tournament ended here today.

Skinner added a par 71 to his first two rounds of 68-70 for a final total of 209, 18 strokes less than that of Oliver (Boots) Baird, the runner-up from New Glasgow, N.S., to win the pro and open crowns.

Reed slipped badly from his first two 69-74 rounds with a final 77 to finish with a 220 total. But that still left him five strokes in front of John Steele of Riverside, N.B., who finished second, and gave him a second to Skinner in the open division.

Skinner and Reed, established as pre-tournament favorites, led from opening day and were seriously threatened or overtaken.

Skinner's total is an all-time low for the tournament in the pro and open ranks. He succeeds Kas Zabolowski of Halifax as pro titleholder. Reed, a war veteran like Skinner, equaled the amateur record set by Cecil Dowling of Charlottetown in winning the amateur and open titles last year.

Competing as a pro this year, Dowling rallied after a bad start to finish fourth with 161-75-237, six strokes back of Ray (Silver) Marshall of New Glasgow, N.S., Quebec Aces star forward.

Former National Hockey League star, Pete Kelly of Fredericton tied for third in the amateur division with T. K. (Tommy) Stewart of St. Andrew's, N. B. Both had 152-75-22.

Next in line were two Charlottetown golfers—Bill Beer with 149-79-228 and Maurice (Mouse) Dowling, Sydney, N. S. hockey player with 156-76-232.
