

PROVINCIAL SANATORIUM IS TO BE OPENED TODAY

Is Last Word In Convenience Modern Equipment And Scientific Construction.

Is A Credit To The Builders, The Province The Women's Institutes And The Sanatorium Commission.

The new Provincial Sanatorium, the construction of which was completed some time ago, is to be formally opened this afternoon at 2.30. Located on McGill Avenue, the institution has ample room for forty-eight patients, but provision is made for the accommodation of a number more. All the beds in the wards are already filled.

The new Sanatorium is the last word in convenience, modern equipment, and scientific construction. On the second and third floors the eight-bed wards are located, one at each corner of the main building, while in the central part the equipment, and the nurses' stands are located, and this each ward is adjacent to the working quarters.
The three floors, the lowest of which is partly below the ground level, are connected both by an elevator shaft and by stairways. The elevator is very commodious, as it is designed for the transportation of patients in beds from one floor to another. The main entrance, reached by a flight of steps, gives access to the second floor, while the side entrance leads to the offices of the institution.
In the east end of the first floor is located the laboratory, and the X-ray equipment. The operating room and the sun lamp room are located in the southern section. The quarters for the help are in the west end while the wing to the rear is occupied by the furnaces and laundry.
The visitor to the institution on passing through the main entrance, enters the large and comfortably furnished reception room on the second floor. The Chesterfield suite was presented to the sanatorium by the Rotary Club, the radio is being installed by the Gyro Club. The piano in the room was presented in memory of Miss Evelyn Windsor. A number of other articles of furniture were also donated. The rubber plant is the gift of Rev. H. D. Raymond. A painting of a scene is the work of Mrs. P. A. Creelman. Two plaques are also to be hung on the wall, one to Mr. George DeBlois for his magnificent contribution, and

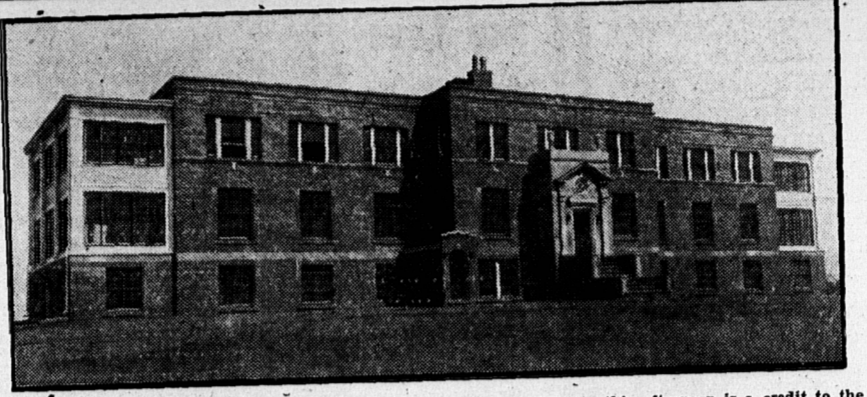

one to the Women's Institutes. The wards and rooms for male patients are located on the second floor. The nurses' stand is at the centre beside the office of Miss Hazel Stearns, dietician and housekeeper. The wing is occupied by the kitchen and pantry, and by dining rooms for nurses and the domestic staff. The kitchen is equipped with a double cooking range steam heater, electric dishwasher and other modern appliances. The refrigerators are located adjacent to the pantry. A large tea wagon is used for the carrying of the patients' trays from the kitchen to the wards.
The four eight-bed wards for female patients are located on the third floor, with two three-bed wards, and a sitting room additional. In the wing to the rear are the nurses' quarters.
The sun porches on the second and third floors which flank the main building on the east and west have accommodation for thirty-two patients. The porches are entirely of glass and have a southern exposure. Individual lockers for patients are provided in each ward or room. Each bed has its electric light, its call buttons, and its radio earphones, all within easy reach of the patient. The walls are finished in grey buff, and the doors in Douglas fir. The floors are varnished. The doorways are unusually wide so as to permit of the passage of the beds. The beds themselves are steel framed with rubber casters, and rubber bumpers. The latter prevent the beds injuring the walls or furniture.
The corridors which run the whole length of the building on each floor are spacious. The floors are covered with inlaid linoleum.
The forty-eight patients already are almost all in the occupational therapy scheme of the institution. Leather placed in the hands of the patients has taken the form of sundry small articles, all exceedingly well wrought.

Men Who Build The New Building

Messrs. Henry C. Lowe and Co., of this City had the general contract for its construction. Mr. Lowe is the oldest active contractor in Canada. He has been in business since he reached manhood over sixty years ago. Besides the new Sanatorium there are many other fine buildings all over the Province, but principally in Charlottetown, which he has built. Among them may be mentioned St. Paul's Church, School and Rectory, St. James Church, Central Christian Church, Cameron Block, DesBrisay Block, north half of Prince of Wales College, Davis & Fraser, which contains more than 1,300,000 brick. MacDonald Consolidated School at Mt. Herbert, Protestant Orphanage at Mt. Herbert, and Fort Augustus Church. In addition, there are hundreds of beautiful homes. Some which may be mentioned are the residences of Messrs. James Paton, W. K. Rogers, Benj. Rogers, George E. Hughes, Allan Cosh and P. W. Turner.
Associated with Mr. Lowe is his son Mr. Weston Lowe.
The building was designed by Mr. E. S. Blanchard, B. Arch.
The system of heating, which was installed by Messrs. Stanley, Shaw and Pearden, is the Dunham Vacuum return line heating system. This system differs from other forms of steam heating in that circulation is produced by the vacuum in the return piping pulling the air out of the radiators and inducing the steam to rush in and fill its place. The vacuum is produced by the Dunham Vacuum Pump. Steam is supplied from two Pacific steel heating boilers twinned together. They are built of special open hearth steel and high grade steel tubes. The high pressure steam is supplied from a vertical Robb boiler.
The plumbing fixtures are the Beaver Brand, manufactured by the Enamel and Heating Products Ltd., and supplied by Stanley Shaw and Pearden.
Radiators valves and radiator traps are placed in the corridors so that the heat can be regulated without having to go into the rooms or wards.
The wiring and installation of all electrical equipment including the Kelvinator Electric Refrigeration was done by Palmer Electric Ltd.
The brick and tile was supplied by L. E. Shaw Ltd., the lumber by the equipment and furniture by Mr. H.M. Simpson. The laboratory supplies came from Ingram and Bell.
