"THE WORLD UPSIDE DOWN"

SERMON BY REV. NEIL HERMAN

The Central Christian Church Was Filled to the Doors Last Sunday Night by an Audience Which Listened With Rapt Attention to the Minister Rev. Neil Herman as he Preached on Some of the Burning Questions of the Hour.

Speaking from the text found in Acts 17:6 which is-"These that have turned the world upside down are come hither also." Mr. Herman said among many other things: "This world is upside down. Look where you will to-night and you will find political unrest everywhere, if not blazing, in every corner of the globe. China is on fire against anything and everything foreign. 'China for the Chinese,' is the one insistent demand of this country. There are hidden fires smouldering in the heart of Japan. A world-wide conflagration will spread over the entire Eastern world. India is burning with resentment against Britain; and even the islands of the sea are set alight with insatiable mania for self-determination. The Eastern political heather is already for the match. May God save us from the fiery judgment.

And Europe is still bleeding at nearly every pore. And America is not what it used to be. Prosperity, on this side of the water, which is the world's champion fishing schooner, is the only thing which is saving us from political combustion. In these days of stress and strain, no party-I care not what name you call it-can long survive. And why this burning unrest in every corner of the world? It is because this man Jesus Christ is the world's savior. He is the one who should abdicate the throne of power, and so the world bleeds and smart because Jesus has stepped down from the place of authority. So long as we postpone bringing back the King, just so long do we delay the coming of peace on earth and good will towards men.

Bluenose's Catch Is 2,600 Quintals

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 24.-The Canadian Government steamer Arras, of the Fisheries protection service, stated in a radio message, received here Saturday that the Lunenburg schooner Bluenose, which had sailed for home, but that the rest of the Lunenburg fleet would probably stay on the fishing grounds for some time. Bait was reported scarce.

Britain Buys Russian Grain

LONDON, Aug. 24.-Buying of grain from South Russia has been in recent weeks, assumed noteworthy proportions, and it becomes evident that earlier estimates of Russia's importance as a grain producer must be revised. The number of steamers lately chartered in London to load Black Sea ports for the United Kingdom or the Continent is estimated at approximately 100, which would provide carrying space for about 500,000 tons of grain.
