BOSTON, June 12—To view the home of Mrs. Illione Meyers, to see whether Mrs. George W. Lidstone or anyone could have peered through the windows and seen her husband with Mrs. Meyers' arms about her neck, as claimed, the jury in the \$25,000 alienation suit of Mrs. Lidstone vs. Mrs. Meyers will go to Wellesley today.

The defence will be that no affection existed between Lidstone, the chauffeur, and his wife, and that the heavy draperies on the windows of the Meyers home make it physically impossible for anyone to see through the windows any such loving scenes as were described by the plaintiff's witnesses.

Francis J. Rail of Cambridge described an espionage he kept on the Meyers house, at the request of one of Mrs. Lidstone's counsel. What he saw corroborated Mrs. Lidstone's testimony and that of other witnesses.

"Sunday morning, December 3, 1910, I saw Mrs. Meyers put her arms about Mr. Lidstone's neck," he testified.

Mrs. Helen LeGracy of Linden, a pretty little woman with a low voice, testified she was acquainted with Mrs. Lidstone, November 27, 1910, went with her to the Meyers house. She went to a front window and saw Mr. Lidstone. The curtain was up an inch or so. Mrs. Meyers came into the room in which Lidstone was seated. Mrs. Meyers played the piano. She watched them for an hour. The Mrs. Meyers pulled down the shade.

On December 4, 1910, she made another visit to Meyers' house, but saw nothing that night, save a woman.

Mr. Lidstone paid his first visit two weeks after his wife came to the house. Heard Lidstone tell his wife he didn't love, he didn't care for her; he wanted a divorce and he had been untrue to her. Mrs. Meyers came with him and remained outside.

BOSTON, June 11—Much interest is evidenced in the \$25,000 damage suit in the Norfolk Superior Court at Dedham, brought by Mrs. Anna E. Lidstone of Brocton against Mrs. Illione Woodbury Meyers of Brookline for alleged alienation of the affections of George W. Lidstone, formerly chauffeur for Mr. and Mrs. Myers.

Mrs. Myers, a member of the Wellesley society set, mother of two girls and enjoying the many luxuries which her husband's large income obtains for her, is accused by Young Mrs. Lidstone of writing letters to her chauffeur, beginning "My own sweetheart" and signed "Your own girl."

Mrs. Lidstone says on the witness stand that she "saw" Mrs. Lidstone from Brookline to Wellesley, locating him, in the Myers home. She swears she saw Mrs. Myers sitting in Lidstone's lap kissing the chauffeur frequently.

These things Mrs. Lidstone saw, she declared, through a window. Mrs. Ann E. Lidstone, the plaintiff in this suit, was a Vermont girl who came to Waltham and there met George W. Lidstone, from Prince Edward Island. She was a blooming country maid. They married. According to a story told by Mrs. Lidstone at the time of her suit was filed, she used part of her scanty savings to pay Lidstone's tuition to an automobile school, so he could become a chauffeur and earn enough for them to wed.

In the spring of 1910 Hiram B. Myers of Wellesley Farms bought an automobile and George W. Lidstone secured the job of running it.

The Lidstones had a little flat in Brookline, Lidstone took a room in Wellesley to be near his work. According to Mrs. Lidstone's story on the open day of the trial she began at that time to notice a change in her husband's feelings towards her.

SEED GRAIN DISAPPOINTING

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., June 12—There has been much dissatisfaction and considerable indignation among the farmers in certain parts of the country over the result of the seeding of grain purchased from merchants this spring.

The farmers indignantly claim that they have been gulled, their claim being that they have been sold grain for seeding purposes which had been frozen and sold to them as government inspected grain. The majority of the farmers say that they do not believe the grain is government inspected, and blame certain dealers for taking them in. Others again say that if the grain is government inspected they believe the government is badly in need of a competent inspector. The result is that a number of the farmers are up in arms and interesting developments are looked for.

According to farmers who were in New Glasgow Saturday, thousands of bushels of worthless grain have been purchased this spring and sown. The result has been that the farmers have had to purchase other grain which they have had to re-sow.

In the event of the grain being sold as government inspected grain, and it has not been inspected, the offense is a serious one and a thorough inspection should be demanded and undertaken.

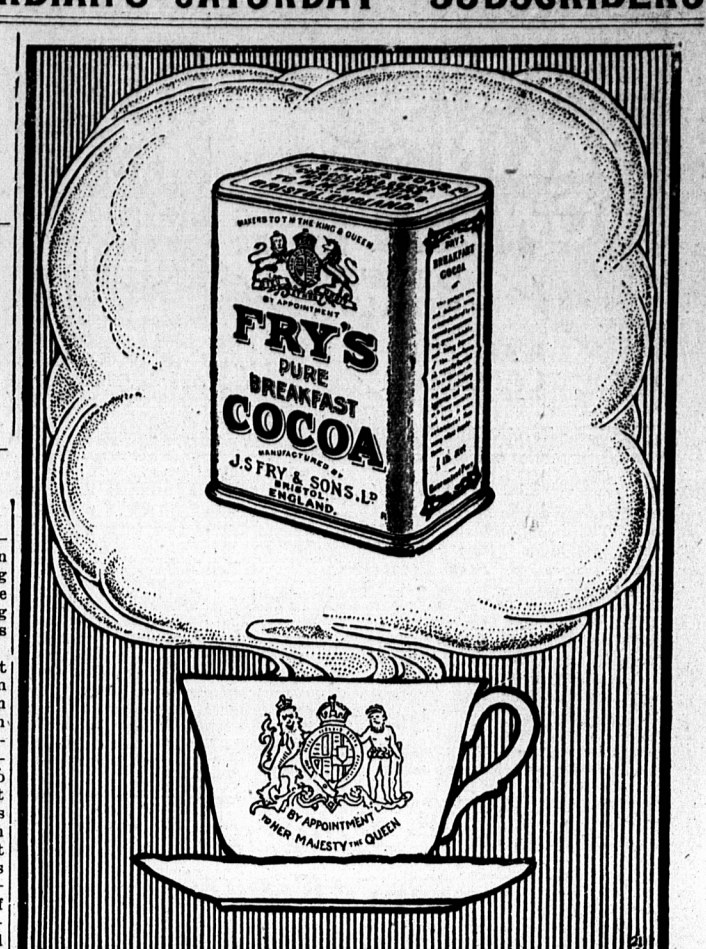

Four Rules for Fertilizing

Justus Von Liebig

1. A soil can be termed fertile only when it contains all the materials necessary for the nutrition of plants, in the required quantity, in the proper form.

2. With every crop a portion of these ingredients is removed. A part of this is again added from the inexhaustible store of the atmosphere; another part, however, is lost forever if not replaced by man.

3. The fertility of the soil remains unchanged if all the ingredients of the crop are given back to the soil. Such a restitution is effected by manure or fertilizers.

4. The manure produced in the course of farming is not sufficient to maintain permanently the fertility of the farm; it lacks the constituents which are annually sold in the shape of grain, hay, milk and live stock.
