PRINCIPAL J D SEAMAN leaves this morning for Moncton, where he will attend the annual meeting of the Summer School of Science, of which he is the Secretary-Treasurer. The session opens with a public meeting this evening, and will continue for two weeks.

OBITUARY.—The residence of Mr Charles Doull, Carleton, Lot 28, was again entered by death Thursday, June 28th, 1898, when his son William J. departed this life at the age of 24 years and 8 months, after a long illness. He received an injury 18 months ago, from which he never recovered in spite of the best medical skill. Amid scenes of brighter days and the kind attention of loving friends he was summoned to that home prepared for the children of God. By the death of Mr Wm J Doull, Carleton has lost one of its most popular young men, leaving behind him a gap that is not easy to fill. Quiet, unassuming and gentle in disposition, to know Wm J Doull was to love and esteem him. His death so soon after that of his mother has evoked a deep and lasting sympathy. His funeral took place on the afternoon of Saturday, the 2nd July, and was very largely attended. Rev John Goodwill conducted the service, assisted by Revs D McLean and A C Bell at his home. His remains were interred beside those of his mother at the Cape Traverse Cemetery.
