BARNUM \$1,000.00 FOREST FIRE RANGER PRIZES AWARDED

The Forest Ranger Prizes annually offered by Frank J. D. Barnum for the best forest fire protection service in Nova Scotia have just been awarded for the season of 1927 as follows: First Prize of \$500.00 to H. B. Verge, Barss' Corner, Lunenburg County; Second Prize \$350.00 to W. B. Fraser, Waterish, Guysboro County and Third Prize \$150.00 to George S. Dickey, Middle Musquodoboit, Halifax County.

McGILL GETS FINE DONATION

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 2. - Nine Persian manuscripts dealing with natural history and ornithology have been presented to the Redpath Library of McGill University by Dr. Casey A. Wood, of Chicago. These were obtained in the Far East, and in some cases show the effects of tropical insects. One of the most interesting volumes in the collection is a treatise on falconry by Nur-ud-din Yar Jani, one of the falconers at the Court of Muhammad Mu'azzam, son of Anzib. This prince received his title of Bahadur Shah in 1672 A.D., and, as he is called in the volume only a shahzad, not a sultan yet, it is possible that the treatise was composed between this date and 1707 A.D., the date of his ascension on the throne.

After the Battle

By "T.L.C." Jack McKenna, the two-fisted and hard-hitting king of Canadian middleweights, a product of Prince Edward Island and a credit to his heritage, the greatest and most colorful fighter of his weight the Maritimes have ever produced. He came, he conquered, and when departing he took with him the respect and admiration of the Garden Province. Not in a long time, unless McKenna is matched to fight here again, will Islanders have the privilege of watching such a colorful and two-fisted boxer. The Patriot compared him to his name-sake Jack Dempsey, and well might it be said; his forging and devastating attack, always on the offensive with his powerful right raising havoc at all times, coupled with a terrible two-hand barge in the in-fighting surely earns for him the Jack Dempsey cognomen of the Maritimes if not the whole of Canada.

Local fans no doubt remember the night of September 29th last when Jack McKenna battered down Morris McDonald, the "Alberta Bear" and champion of that Province in six rounds, but they never treated to the fury of his attack until last Friday night. Cool and collected he carried the fight to the Western champion, Harry Runicorn in each and every minute of the four rounds. I had the privilege of being his chief second that night and knew the style of fighting he was going to adopt; in fact his offensive was carefully planned days before the bout, which proved he has more than the ordinary fighting heart and endurance, he has the "grey matter" as well, and knows how and when to use it. He is not much for talking prior to a bout, but remarked to me one day "there are two great essentials in the boxing game, one must know how to box a fighter, and then again one must be in condition and know how to fight a boxer." Runicorn is a wonderful boxer, but could not stand up against the furious onslaught of his opponent. McKenna's vicious body punches would have knocked out any ordinary boxer in two rounds, but Runicorn proved to be a master-hand at blocking and stayed longer than most of the 1200 or more fans anticipated.

The Logical Champion
Although there is no middleweight champion of Canada recognized by the Ontario Boxing Commission, Jack McKenna may not be proclaimed the logical middleweight champion of Canada; and if he isn't who is? Reddick was the champion and lost to Mark Moore who in turn lost to Harry Runicorn. McKenna then demonstrated via the knock-out route that he was Runicorn's master.

Jack left Saturday afternoon by the Hochelaga en route to Sydney where he will taper off with such experienced boxers as John Alex McIntyre, Buddy Lewis, Stevie McDonald and other in preparation for his coming fight with Rene Devos, Belgium middleweight champion, in Halifax on Thursday night. McKenna will have a hard fight on his hands when he meets Devos who fought George Capentore during the times, earning one draw over the ten round route. He also received a fair-line decision over the late "Battling" Siki, conqueror of Carpenter and once light heavyweight champion of the world. However McKenna's friends which are legion in the Maritimes especially Prince Edward Island wish him every luck and are pulling for him to get the popular verdict.

A Meteoric Career

As a lad, Jack McKenna, a robust, healthy and clean living boy in his early teens, after school hours loved to spend his recreation hours around the various gymnasiums in Sydney and Glace Bay. He loved the boxing game and had for his idols Johnny McIntyre and Mickey and his brother, Roddy McDonald and others. He longed to be a boxer and to enjoy the perfect physical condition attained through long routines of training. At the age of fifteen he got his first chance to "put 'em on" with a real live boxer. From that day Jack was determined to follow the game. He acted as sparring partner for all the boys down Cape Breton way, and while doing so, at the same time taking some bad trimmings, he soon learned how to hit, block and get away. The boys down there began to take notice, especially the fighters in training. Jack was becoming more and more daring. They realized he had a wallop besides grit and determination and developed into a prime favorite amongst the sporting fraternity. At the age of sixteen after a hard road of training in which he conditioned himself, he decided he would try the sweetest boxing. He got a few fights and his first victory. He had many bouts after that and always won by a big margin. Those at home did not take kindly to Jack and his boxing mania, and received the surprise of their lives when he broke the news of his departure for Halifax to participate in the amateur tournament. They let him go however, to return home a few days after with the amateur welterweight championship of the Maritime Provinces tucked under his belt and the proud possessor of a hundred dollar cup and gold watch emblematic of same. He did not remain long an amateur, and at nineteen years of age fought his first professional bout, losing a hair-line decision to Neddy Healey in Halifax. Healey was 'classed at that time as one of the greatest welters in the Maritimes.

The Weighing-In Question
On Friday morning, the day of the fight, it was agreed by the promoter and fighters that the weighing-in would be dispensed with as each man was willing to accept the other's weight as being within the middleweight limit. However, Mr. Bennie, Runicorn's manager had a change of mind and insisted on weighing in in the afternoon. The reason why McKenna could not be found is easily explained. It happened to be with him in the afternoon when he took a motor ride into the

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ferent kinds of fruit and each season sees some new varieties of special promise produced. Among the new varieties of apples that have been bred during recent years and have been planted in commercial orchards as soon as stock was available are the Melba, Joyce, Loh o and Lawfam. The Melba is an early apple of Duchess season and McIntosh quality, we I coloured and attractive, Loh o is fully equal to McIntosh in appearance, but is not of quite as good quality. It is earlier than McIntosh and is recommended for Eastern Ontario and Quebec.

Several additional varieties of hardy pears fruited in 1926. They are crosses between Russian pears and some of the better commercial varieties grown in Canada and some of them show great promise as hardy pears of fairly good quality. They are more resistant to blight than many other varieties and may be grown in colder districts. Five new varieties of ever-bearing strawberries are exceptionally promising and are expected when thorough tested, to prove superior to existing sorts.

FEEDING COWS FOR WINTER MILK PRODUCTION

(Experimental Farms Note.) The aim in feeding for winter milk production is to produce the greatest amount of milk and butter at the least possible expense. In order to do this we must imitate, as closely as possible, conditions during the early summer when there is abundance of palatable, succulent feed.

The ration must be well balanced. That is, there must be sufficient protein to balance the carbohydrates. Legume hay is usually the cheapest source of protein. Therefore, the dry roughage should contain as large a percentage of either clover or alfalfa hay as possible. Succulent feeds keep the cows in good health and are very palatable, therefore, either roots or silage should be fed to enable the cows to make the best use of the other feeds in the ration.

For maximum milk production the ration should contain a liberal allowance of concentrates. Concentrates are usually the expensive part of the ration. Therefore, in feeding concentrates, each cow should be fed individually. The amount it will pay to feed will depend partly on the price of concentrates as compared with roughage and partly on the amount and quality of milk each cow is producing.

At the Fredericton Experimental Station the cows are fed all the mixed cover and timothy hay they will eat with from 25-40 pounds of corn silage or up to 50 pounds of roots. Heavy producers are fed 1 pound of grain for each 1-2 pounds of milk. Medium producers are fed 1 pound of grain for each 4 pounds of milk that they produce. The grain ration fed is composed for the most part of 1 part bran, 1 part crushed oats, 1 part linseed meal and 2 parts brewers' grain, and 1 per cent of salt is added at mixing.

It should always be borne in mind, that cows will not make the most profitable use of feed consumed unless they are fed and watered regularly, given comfortable quarters and allowed to exercise each day.

BELIEVES PARTY KIDNAPPED BY MOROCCANS WILL BE FREED BY RANSOM NEGOTIATIONS

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 31.-M. Steeg, French resident-general of Morocco, believes his nephew and three companions who were kidnapped by dissident tribesmen, will be freed shortly as a result of ransom negotiations, according to a despatch from Tangier to Lanacou. The resident-general said the kidnapping should not be taken too seriously as it was only an isolated case prompted by the imprudence of the party, which had been warned that the region into which it went was dangerous.



"I have had a happy life, but it has been full of cares and worries. I had a great responsibility in the early days of the Salvation Army—I had to manage my father. MATERNAL MORTALITY SHOULD BE STOPPED

LONDON, Ont., Nov. 3.—"The stigma of a maternal mortality rate that shows little improvement must be removed" was the challenge fairly hurled at the annual convention of the Ontario United Hospital Aids Association by Dr. Helen MacMurchy. The latter is chief of the Federal Department of Child Welfare.

"No mother should die in childbirth," declared the little "chief." "If we lose the mother, we lose the home, and if we lose the home, we lose everything. Memorial and nicely-kept graves are not nearly as valuable as to keep our citizens alive for those precious years from birth to 70, which is our allotted span." Quoting from the findings of the national inquiry of the 59th year of Confederation, Dr. MacMurchy showed that 1,532 mothers died in child birth in 1926. "Speaking generally, these were all preventable deaths, and though it will take us a few more years to prevent absolutely all of them, we could prevent at least a thousand now," she declared.

Pre-natal care was strongly urged, and in the establishment of this as a natural custom, Dr. MacMurchy again enlisted the help of such organizations as the Hospital Aids. Citing some of the practical ways in which the efforts and influence of the aids may be applied, the speaker suggested "an objective a 'hospital every 20 miles in every town, and the establishment of ambulances, home help, speaker said. She enlisted the greater services of the father as connected with the hospitals.

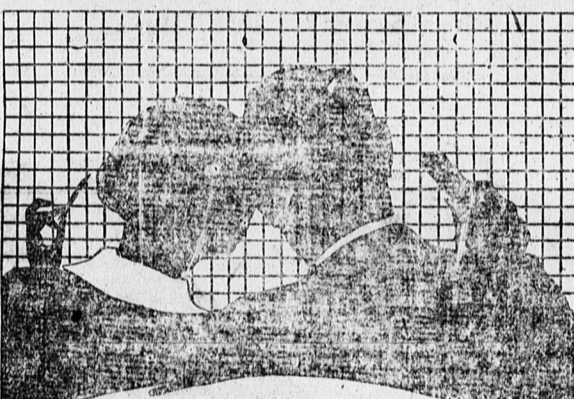
