DIED OF PNEUMONIA.—The death occurred on Sunday January 5th at 10.30 p.m. at her home in this city, of Ina Althea Jenkins, wife of Mr. Benjamin Simpson, and eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John R. Jenkins, Dundas. Death was due to pneumonia.

AERIAL PROPOSITION.—The Guardian understands that the big aerial transport company recently organized in St. John, N. B. with a capital of two and a half million dollars has made overtures to the P. E. Island Aerial Transport Company, now in course of organization, to amalgamate with the former. No action has yet been taken in the matter by the local committee but the proposition gives some idea of what is anticipated in the aerial world.

SUDDEN DEATH AT MALPEQUE.—Residents of Malpeque and vicinity were shocked and saddened on learning of the sudden death of Miss Margaret Bearsto which occurred yesterday morning. She had been in somewhat delicate health for some time past but had improved latterly and was about as usual up to the time of her death. She was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Bearsto of Malpeque. She was a lady of rare beauty of character and one whom all loved who knew her. She was a lifelong member of the Malpeque Presbyterian Church with whose welfare and activities she was always closely associated and in which as well as in the social life of the community she will be greatly missed. There are left to mourn, besides a large circle of relatives and friends, one sister, Mrs. Mary E. McLeod of Winnipeg, and Mr. Frank Bearsto, Wetaskiwin, Alta., to whom the Guardian tenders deepest sympathy. The funeral takes place tomorrow, Tuesday at 2 o'clock to the Malpeque Cemetery.

Assassin Ended the Life of Count Stephen Tisza Typical Magyar Autocrat

TYRANNY had no greater friend than Count Tisza, the former Hungarian Premier, whose life was ended by a bullet from an assassin's revolver two days before the Austrians made unconditional surrender to the terms of the Allies. Count Stephen Tisza, typical as a Magyar magnate, was the best-hated man in Hungary. His political opponents of his own rank fought duels with him; those of inferior rank tried to assassinate him. One of the three whom he met on the "field of honor" in 1913, and wounded, was Count Michael Karolyi, now President of the Revolutionary National Council. The last unsuccessful attempt to assassinate him was on Oct. 16, when Leitner, an official of the Food Department, drew a revolver on him, but was prevented by the count's chauffeur from using it. Tisza was a powerful man, both physically and mentally; his patriotism was ambitious. His one aim was to promote the greatness and glory of Hungary. Austria and even Germany he regarded as mere pawns in his game. He made use of the

late Archduke Francis Ferdinand by having him agitate the scheme of a triune monarchy made up of Germans, Magyars, and Slavs in place of the dual monarchy, believing that the new government would be centralized at Budapest rather than at Vienna. The whole scheme of Balkan policy was his—to prevent the states there from growing strong or forming a league, for the benefit of Russia against Turkey.

He was Premier of Hungary in 1914 and was quick to see the opportunities offered by the assassination of the Archduke Francis Ferdinand, the heir presumptive, at Sarajevo. It is said that he at once communicated privately with friends at the Wilhelmstrasse and the result was the Austro-Hungarian action in case Russia intervened to save Serbia.

Although Count Berchtold was the Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, it is said that the ultimatum to Serbia, delivered by Baron Gieseler, the Austro-Hungarian Minister at Belgrade, on July 23 was largely Tisza's work.

Born in Budapest in 1861, Tisza had, since he entered politics as a clerk in the Ministry of the Interior in 1882, exercised a power far beyond his official offices. He was first Premier from 1903 to 1906, and then from 1912 to May 23, 1917.

Up to the time of his retirement last year he fought in Parliament for the Austro-Hungarian alliance and the continuance of the war until that alliance won. A year ago, however, he began to speak of the alliance as a burden and the war as being prolonged by Germany. He began to favor autonomy for the nationalities of Hungary.

At the end of September, 1918, when the probability of a separate peace of Austro-Hungary had become obvious, he was one of three Hungarian statesmen called to Vienna to advise the Emperor, the others being Count Andrássy and Apponyi.

Both were his intimate political foes, both had accused him of being the German Kaiser's agent. On the other hand Andrássy's admiration for Great Britain and Apponyi's for the United States were well known.

A Short War. Spain declared war against the United States April 24, 1898. The first American army of invasion of Cuba, under Gen. Shafter, sailed from Tampa, Fla., June 14, and landed at Santiago, Cuba, June 23. The battle between the "Rough Riders" and the Spanish forces occurred on June 24, the battle of El Caney on July 1 and the surrender of Santiago on July 16.

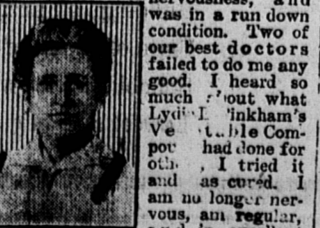
