A WANT SUPPLIED

Among the many good things to the credit of the present progressive government there are few perhaps more worthy of special mention than the year book for 1913 which has just been issued. This little book, consisting of a little over a hundred pages, gives in concise form a resume of the legislation of the year, with a brief summary of the most important acts; a summary of the year's work in the Agricultural Department; a list of the Farmers' Institutes and Women's Institutes in the province; the Dairymen's and Breeders' Associations; a chapter on the fox farming industry with a complete list of the fox companies; the Fox Breeders' Association and Fox Exchanges; a chapter on the fisheries of P. E. Island with a list of the lobster canneries, and the values of the different kinds of fish taken during the year; a summary of the work done by the Department of Public Works; the institutions at Falconwood; a chapter on Education with a list of all the schools in the province, the different colleges and convents, legislative and judicial departments; Boards of Health; vital statistics; trade conditions; postal regulations; a chapter on the coming Confederation Jubilee celebration, the different municipal Councils, clergy, fraternal societies; the Civil list; a list of the finances of the province since 1874 giving receipts and expenditures the sources of revenue during the past year and, much other information included in or apart from the above.

The year book will be found to be a veritable educator and the government in issuing it, is following up its well known policy of publicity and information. Nothing can help this province more than the telling of its own story, its resources, its possibilities, its successes and even its failures.

We have a magnificent history marred here and there, it is true, by penuriousness rather than poverty; by discouragements without cause; by misguided and cheese paring policies. Yet with all these and in spite of these there has been steady progress, slow at times but always upward, and today our province is planted firmly on its feet, its basic industry, agriculture, far and away ahead of that in the provinces whose most flaunted advantages allured so many of our people during the past twenty years; our fox farming industry, our oyster industry, our fisheries and the few manufacturing industries that we have ventured upon are flourishing and each advertising in its own way the resources of the province.

What is needed is to keep this story of development before our people and a yearly record of the production, the legislation, the institutions, the progress of the province, in the manner followed in the year book before us, is a most effective method of keeping the story fresh and interesting. "Knowledge is power" and a knowledge of our own land is the safest foundation that can be laid for real education, for loyalty and patriotism. A copy of the year book for 1913 should be placed in every home in the province and provision should be made for similar service in the years to come. The edition, however, is limited but, if no better can be done this year, a copy should at least be placed in every school in the province and its contents made a part of the regular curriculum.

NOTES

June eggs increased in price from 104 cents in 1903 at the rate of about one cent a year until 1913 when they were selling at 20 cents. September eggs increased from 13 cents in 1903 at a little more rapid

rate until 1913 when they reached the respectable figure of 26 cents.

While the manufacture of butter in Prince Edward Island during the past decade does not show any increase it is significant to note that the production per patron has increased from 279 pounds in 1901 to 618 in 1913. There was a large decrease in the number of patrons during this time but the above figures show a most creditable improvement in the methods employed and in the quality of the dairy cows. Those who have stuck to the business have made money by it.

According to explanation recently made in the House of Commons there are in use in the United Kingdom 723,000 telephones, representing a value of about \$115,000,000. At the close of the fiscal year 1912-13, according to the statistics of the Department of Railways and Canals there were in use in Canada over 463,000 telephones which represented a capital liability of \$69,214,000. In Canada, generally under private ownership, the use of the telephone is far greater than in Great Britain where it is a public service. In this country there is in use a telephone for each 16 persons; in Great Britain there is one only for each 62 persons. The case appears to be one of private energy being more effective and more popular than public content.

BODY IN MILL RACE

GUELPH, ONT., May 16.—Judge Hugh McDonald Henry, of Halifax, N. S., an inmate of the Homewood Sanitarium for more than three years was drowned this afternoon. He went out for his usual afternoon walk down town and must have started to return through Riverside Park, for his body was found by two little girls about five o'clock, in the mill race between Riverside dam and Sampson's Mill. Judge Henry was about sixty-three years of age and had been partially paralyzed for the past fourteen years. He is a brother of W. A. Henry, K. C., Halifax, and was for some years judge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, and one of the best known citizens of Halifax. It is thought that he slipped into the mill-race and could not get out.

AROUND THE FUR RANCHES

Mr. Simon Jordan, Keeper of the Murray Harbour Ranching Company, which last year paid a dividend of two hundred per cent., reports the arrival on the ranch of six pups from this company's Dalton Silver Black female which last year produced a litter of five. Mr. Jordan expects other litters to appear on the ranch very shortly.

The Willow Hill Fox Ranch, near Summerside, reports 33 pups from seven pairs of pure silver foxes. The Eastern Black Foxes Limited have on their ranch two litters of eleven foxes. These together with several others already reported will help to sum up quite a respectable harvest of silvers for 1914.

Good reports are received from the ranch of the Record Fox and Fur Company, whose stock has now all been sold. It is understood that some six or seven litters have already appeared, and more are expected. This company is one of the biggest cross-fox companies operating in the Province. Cross and batch-fox ranching is assuring considerable importance in the fur-raising industry and offers opportunities of profit hardly to be excelled. The foxes of this company are all reported to be well.

SUFFRAGETTE "GENERAL" CAMPS ON ULSTER LEADER'S DOORSTEP

LONDON, May 14.—"General" Mrs. Flora Drummond, leader of militant suffragettes, this morning pitched her camp on the doorstep of Sir Edward Carson's residence in Eton Place and informed the Ulster leader that she, as a militant, had come to him as another militant, to seek his protection from arrest. Mrs. Drummond has been summoned to appear at the police court this afternoon in connection with the campaign of militancy, and as she had made up her mind not to appear before the magistrate she expected to be arrested and declared she would remain on Sir Edward Carson's doorstep and appeal to him for protection when the police arrived to take her into custody.

Mrs. Dacre-Fox, another prominent militant suffragette, who also had been summoned to appear at the police court on a charge of inciting women to commit crime, appealed to the Marquis of Lansdowne, Unionist leader in the House of Lords, at his residence in Berkeley Square. She hammered at the door for a long time and caused the assembly of a big crowd before she was arrested by the police.

BILL AGAINST TIPPING DISCUSSED IN THE CANADIAN SENATE

OTTAWA, May 16.—The Senate gave the Bill against tipping a long step forward Thursday by putting it through the committee stage.

Senator Davis, the author of the Bill said he thought there should be no amendment which would make a distinction between the penalties provided against employers and employees. He would not like to see a boy or girl who took remuneration for helping a rich person in a hotel fined \$25 or \$50 or be sentenced to a term in jail. If employers were under penalties they would see their employees took no tips. The Senator said that in Winnipeg and Montreal waiters had formally expressed their approval of the Bill.

Senators Choquette and Boyer said there might be difficulty in enforcing the law, the latter also doubting whether Parliament would be adding to its dignity in enacting such legislation.

On motion of Senator David, of Montreal, the Bill was amended by declaring that it should not apply to "servants in private residences."

CARL GREY COMING AT DUKE'S REQUEST.

MONTREAL, May 15.—With the cordial approval, and indeed at the suggestion it is understood, of the Duke of Connaught, Earl Grey, who is now at Los Angeles, California, on his way home from Australia, will come to Canada before returning to the Old Country. It was the intention of Earl Grey, Lady Grey and Lady Sibyl to sail from New York on the 29th. But through the action of the Duke in setting aside the tradition that a Governor General may not revisit the country in which he has served, Earl Grey will come to Ottawa and Toronto and it is expected will attend the wedding races where he enjoyed such exceptional popularity and in which he was always greatly interested while he was Governor-General.

BECKER TRIAL ADJOURNED

NEW YORK, May 16.—The Becker trial has been adjourned till Monday and a verdict is expected by the end of next week.

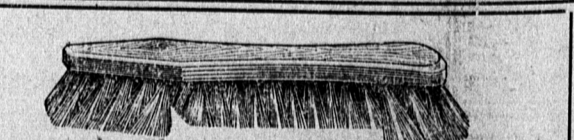
