### Woman Held For \$50,000 Ransom

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 10.—Mrs. Berry V. Stoll, young society leader and wife of a wealthy oil man, was seized from her fashionable home late today by a kidnapper who left a note containing a demand for \$50,000 ransom. Reason by the abductor who gained entrance to the house on a pretext and left her maid bound and gagged, Mrs. Stoll was spirited away in an automobile. Federal, city and county authorities immediately began a wide search.

### 8 PERSONS TRAPPED IN HALIFAX BLAZE

By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Oct. 11.—(Thursday)—Eight persons were trapped in the ruins of a three-story building that collapsed following a mysterious dynamite explosion here early today. A ninth occupant of the building, Robert Crouse, was blown through the front door to the street. Crouse was not seriously injured and regained consciousness in hospital but he said he knew nothing more than that he had been standing in the hallway when the blast occurred. At four o'clock firemen were battling flames in an attempt to rescue Crouse's wife and their three children, Mrs. Dan Dudas and her two children, and an unidentified man boarding in the building. No explanation of why the dynamite was in the building could be obtained immediately as police joined firemen in the rescue efforts and left their investigation for later. At 4.15 the ruins were a mass of flames. A wall left standing after the explosion fell in and fears were expressed that the trapped people were doomed.

### REVOLT DYING OUT IN SPAIN

By Guardian's Special Wire) MADRID, Oct. 10.—Eleven more deaths were added to the toll of unreported hundreds tonight with reports from the War Ministry that Foreign Legion forces imported from Morocco had completed a mop-up campaign at Oviedo, northern Spain. The Oviedo garrison was enabled to dispatch additional troops to reinforce the army in the mountainous mining sections of the Province where some rebel strongholds, the last remaining of the disastrous red revolt, still held forth. It was reported warships operating off the Asturias coast had backed up the Foreign Legion troops with bombardments on rebel nests located near the coast on the Bay of Biscay. Government information revealed that tonight Major Bosch, commander of the Catalonia militia, had been sentenced to life imprisonment by a summary court martial at Barcelona. It was added that nine similar cases are on schedule at Madrid, and that several death penalties were likely.

### QUEEN'S STUDENT DATE BUREAU OPENED

KINGSTON, Ont., Oct. 10.—The "date bureau" is again in evidence at Queen's University, and is conducted for the purpose of bringing lonesome male and female students together. During the past week several first year co-eds and male sophomores have been brought together for social times. The bureau charges a fee of 10 cents for each "date" successfully arranged. Applicants may choose "Dutch" plan of paying if they desire.

### Boston Fishermen's Strike Continues To Spread

By Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, Oct. 10.—The strike of Boston fishermen has spread today as crews of vessels arriving at the fish pier left their berths in their fight for larger shares in the proceeds of catches. Twenty-one vessels came in with nearly 700,000 pounds of fish. Three were steamed trawlers, seven were schooners and the others were small dragnets, chiefly of the Italian and Portuguese fleet, which has not been affected by the strike. Between 50 and 100 men left the larger vessels without siding in unloading them, and thus forfeited their claims to a share in the products of their labor. Union officials claimed well over 3,000 men are on strike, but employers insist not more than 1,000 had joined the movement. About 100 non-union fish handlers were put to work at the fish pier today, to aid captains, mates and clerks in the unloading of vessels. Fish moved slower than normal, and that probably accounted for the moderate advance in prices. Strikers began picketing the pier from the water today, two men in each boat maintaining a vigil over incoming vessels and shore workers. A police boat was sent to the scene but found no cause for interfering. The pier itself was patrolled by details of police, including a patrol car, the headquarters radical squad, foot and motorcycle policemen, but there were no disturbances.

### OCCUPANTS TRAPPED IN CLOSED CAR

Three Men Drowned When Car Crashed Through Railing of Bridge Into Water of North Lake.

Three men, Pius McPhee, Daniel McIsaac, and James McGregor met a sudden and tragic death late Tuesday evening when the car in which they were riding skidded into the railing of Lakeville Bridge, crashed through, and plunged into the waters of North Lake. A car proceeding in the opposite direction witnessed the accident and immediately summoned aid. The car, resting on some old piles by the side of the bridge, was completely submerged, the top of the car being about eighteen inches under water. The bodies of the victims were removed from the car about half an hour after the accident.

Pius McPhee is the son of Vincent McPhee, and Daniel McIsaac is the son of Angus D. McIsaac both are from St. Margaret's, and are about 23 years of age. James McGregor, better known as "Wee Jim" is about 40 years of age, and is thought to be from Dundee, Scotland, where his father is supposed to live, although to date no definite information has been received. McGregor came to St. Margaret's about two weeks ago and has since been employed by Mr. McIsaac, father of one of the victims. An old-time fiddler's contest, in which McPhee and McGregor took part, was in progress in St. Columba Hall, Fairfield, before the contest was over in case two men drove some people to a neighbor's house, McPhee driving McIsaac's car. On the way back to the hall they plowed up Lakeville Bridge, about a mile from the Hall when the accident occurred. There was a good skidding on the bridge, but the car skidded with considerable force. It had rained that day and the road was very slippery.

An inquest held yesterday by Coroner Daniel McEachern was adjourned until today at 10 o'clock. The probability is that the verdict will be accidental drowning. As it was thought that McGregor came from Glace Bay, Inspector Fripps wired the R. C. M. P. detachment in Sydney for information. He has been informed by them that McGregor is not known in Glace Bay but that he was around Point Tupper and Port Hawkesbury for three or four months early in the summer, leaving that neighborhood in July. It is not known where he was since then until his arrival at St. Margaret's two weeks ago. So far as can be learned, he has no relatives in Cape Breton. From an acquaintance in Port Hawkesbury, it was learned that his father is living in Dundee, Scotland. McGregor's description follows: 6'2 1/2 feet in height, slight build, weight 130 pounds, age, about 40, brown hair, grey-blue eyes, last two joints of right front finger missing. Anyone having definite information as to next of kin are requested to communicate with the R. C. M. P.

### BOMBS HURLED IN HAVANA

HAVANA, Oct. 10.—Bombs and hand grenades exploded throughout Havana today as a campaign of terrorism gained momentum. Six persons were injured. Two hand grenades were hurled against the Central police station. Guards swung into action, firing several shots, and arrested more than 100 persons in the market place.

### Hauptmann Is Ordered Extradited To New Jersey

By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—Extradition of Bruno Hauptmann to New Jersey to stand trial for the abduction and murder of the Lindbergh baby was ordered at Albany late today by Governor Herbert Lehman. A vigorous defence fight to stave off extradition was in prospect for tomorrow. Meanwhile at Washington the Department of Justice withdrew from the case. Announcement of the action was coupled with disclosure that \$48,881 of the \$50,000 ransom money paid by Charles A. Lindbergh had been accounted for in the possession of Hauptmann or in banks and brokerage accounts to his credit. The Justice Department said that it had withdrawn from the case inasmuch as an extortion indictment had been returned by a New York grand jury and a murder indictment issued in New Jersey. As Governor Lehman signed the extradition papers, according to Jersey's claim of first lien on the stow-away from Germany, defence attorney James M. Fawcett was hurrying to New York to prepare for the court test. Fawcett said he would apply tomorrow in a Bronx court for a writ of habeas corpus. If granted, extradition would be held in abeyance until a court could hear Hauptmann's refutation of charges that he stole the first-born of the flying Lindberghs from his Hopewell home the night of March 1, 1932; that baby Lindbergh was killed in the perpetration of abduction.

Police Are Active As Day Passes Quietly On Continent.

### King Peter Slips Secretly Into Paris

Large Crowd Awaits In Vain For Arrival Of Young King At Station.

By Guardian's Special Wire) PARIS, Oct. 10.—Caught up in the dangerous swirl of Balkan politics, although but 11 years old, little Peter, the son of the assassinated King of Yugoslavia, came secretly into Paris tonight to meet his grief-stricken mother. Through jammed station in Paris when his train arrived, eager for a glimpse of the lad, as authorities prepared elaborate precautions to mask the route by which he was to reach his destination. Peter was awakened today at his English countryside school, told of his father's death and his accession to the throne and taken away at once by his grandmother, Queen Marie of Rumania, who had been visiting the British Royal Family. He will meet his mother tomorrow when she reaches Paris from Marseille, where, accompanied by the President of France, she saw her husband's body taken aboard the Yugoslav warship Dubrovnik today on its way home to Belgrade. French and Yugoslav notables, including Minister of War Henri Flandin and the Paris Prefect of Police, M. Lengronne, were among the crowds that awaited the boy-king's arrival at the station. Police helped preserve the illusion that Peter would arrive there, heavy forces holding back the curious and other squads shepherding newspapermen into the baggage room. But the special car in which Peter and Marie were travelling was detached from the train at St. Denis, outside Paris, where Etienne Flandin, Minister of Public Works, was waiting with an automobile of the government. Thus they slipped into Paris unobserved. Enroute from England with Queen Marie, the little king was visibly moved. As the channel boat pulled away from English shores Peter stood on the deck looking back toward the land where only a few weeks ago he arrived to begin his school life. The Queen, apparently sensing that his carefree school days were over and that it might be years before he saw those shores again, took him gently by the shoulder and said: "Look, my boy." Tears rolled down Peter's cheeks as the land faded from sight. He and his mother will go to Belgrade together to meet the Dubrovnik.
