Misses Eltha Feehan and Leona Jay, nurses in training at the City Hospital, were recent visitors to their home in Mt. Stewart.

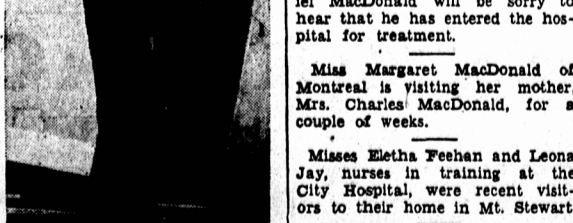
The regular weekly dance of the Canadian Legion was held in their hall on Thursday night with a very large crowd, and a good time was enjoyed.

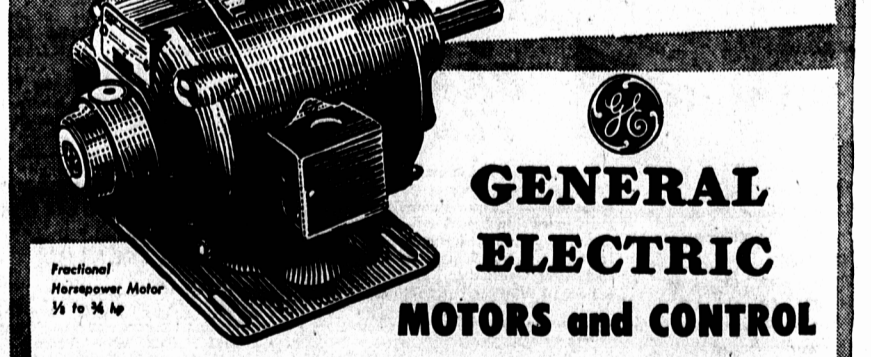
