Potatoes, beets, turnips, and carrots made up the cargoes brought in by the schooners Minnie Mac, Captain Hyde; Sir Louis, Captain Hare, and Effie May, from Prince Edward Island this morning. Cargoes of this kind coming so late in the season are something new, and when the schooners are raised up the harbor and it became known what they carried, buyers were red hot after them. Later they ascertained that the cargoes had been disposed of long before the schooners arrival. The schooner Minnie Mac brought 1600 bushels of oats, 2028 bushels of potatoes, four bushels of carrots and twelve bushels of beets and turnips. The schooner Sir Louis brought 3,000 bushels of oats and 800 bushels of potatoes. The schooner Effie May brought 500 bushels of potatoes. Potatoes in the city are selling at a good price, eighty cents a bushel being received without a murmur. The reason given for such late arrival is that the vessels were unable to get away before owing to ice conditions.—Halifax Chronicle.

McLeod had been walking on the trail above, and had slipped. Ensign Johnstone is to conduct the funeral today. It will be attended by members of the staff of the Atlin Construction Co., and of the Order of Foresters, as well as many friends of the deceased. John McLeod will be chief mourner."

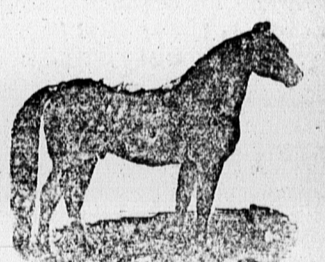
