## Governor Heartz's Praise of Scots

His Honour, Lieut Governor Heartz in replying to the toast of the Scots and love of country, after last night said: "It is with pride and satisfaction on this glorious Centenary occasion that I stand before you not only as the representative of His Gracious Majesty, but also for having the privilege of saying a few words before this, one of the oldest and most historical and loyal societies, in the Province of Prince Edward Island.

The British Empire comprises millions of people of various nationalities, and amongst these, the Scots of Scotland, whose name is legion are numbered with the greatest and the best.

In old Scotland itself there dwells some four or five millions of hardy, and brainy people—the salt of the earth. From their portion, a small part of the British Isles, have come to other countries a manhood and womanhood second to none in the Universe on sea or land in virility, courage, and hospitality.

The history of Scotland is perhaps the most thrilling of all histories. From Striven Ploddin Field to the most memorable war of all time the Scotch warriors have proved time and again their dauntless courage and their matchless fighting qualities. The record of the Scots in the Crimea, in the Napoleonic wars, and in the vast conflict from 1814 to 1818 is truly magnificent and equally wonderful. The Scotch soldiers, usually ranked with the most famous English, French and Canadian soldiers, and in the Canadian Army itself the Scotch Battalions made remarkable and enviable records.

Three fundamental qualities of the Scots are love of country, pride of race, fear of God—A Scotch man can always be depended upon to do his duty no matter what the cost. They are ready to render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's, but they are ready also to disregard what Caesar should have and should not have, and they are distinguishedly candid and frank in expressing their views, about it. Gentlemen you cannot sit down on Scotland's emblem, the Thistle.

I might tonight briefly mention why the Scotchman is so proud of his race. The names of famous authors and philosophers, warriors and statesmen spring into recollection on such a glorious occasion as this. Wallace, Burns, Bruce, Scott, Carlyle, Stephenson, Watt, Kelvin, Oswald, Smith, Livingstone, and Macgregor too numerous to mention are recalled by the spirited music of the bagpipes, and the memorable celebration of St. Andrew's Day.

Other nations have their great outstanding names of distinguished men, but the world would not be what it is at its best in thought, in character, in achievement, in courage in genius without that contribution which Scotland has given in all that makes life great, worthy and illustrious.

I have merely touched the fringe of the war-like spirit, the hospital-

ity, the intellectually and the achievement of the Scotch. Had I time tonight I would like to dwell upon the immortal melodies in song that Scotch singers have given to mankind. For instance, Annie Laurie, Ye Hundred Pipers, My Ain Country, Ye Banks and Braes O' Bonny Loom, The Land of the Leal, Auld Robin Gray, The Banks o' Loch Lomond, Sitka Wa' Hee, Mary o' Argyle, The Highlanders' Toast, We'd Better Bide A Wee, and the deathless "Old Lang Syne".

His Gracious Majesty the King whose health you have so enthusiastically drunk, as well as the Great Empire of which we form so important a part, and the world at large owes a debt to Scotland which can never be paid in full. From that little land of the cakes and the heather have come pioneers, teachers, preachers, statesmen, financiers, poets, inventors, engineers and Empire builders. Their works are known in all lands, from the rising to the setting of the sun. Men of big brains, big hearts, and big souls. As the old Scotch farmer living in the Highlands when asked "What that rocky part of Scotland could raise?" he proudly replied: "We raise men, sir, what else is there?"

Gentlemen, it may be that some of the people here assembled are inclined to look upon my somewhat rambling remarks as merely words gotten up for the occasion. I wish to disabuse your minds of any such thoughts. What I have said tonight are the sentiments and opinions I have formed from a life long connection, in business and socially with Scotchmen, not only in my native Province, but in many parts of the world, and especially in Canada. Neither can we accuse me of vain boasting in lauding my own race, because as I look around this festive board, surrounded as I am by men prominent in every walk in life, I doubt if there is one person here who has as little Scotch in him as I have—Of course I refer to Scotch blood.

Therefore, it is fitting that the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island should celebrate with true Scottish ardour their one hundredth Anniversary Celebration and the memorable anniversary of Scotland's patron—Saint Andrew.

They seem to grow the fonder O' everything that's Scotch in name,

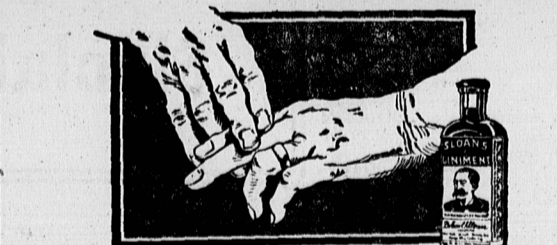

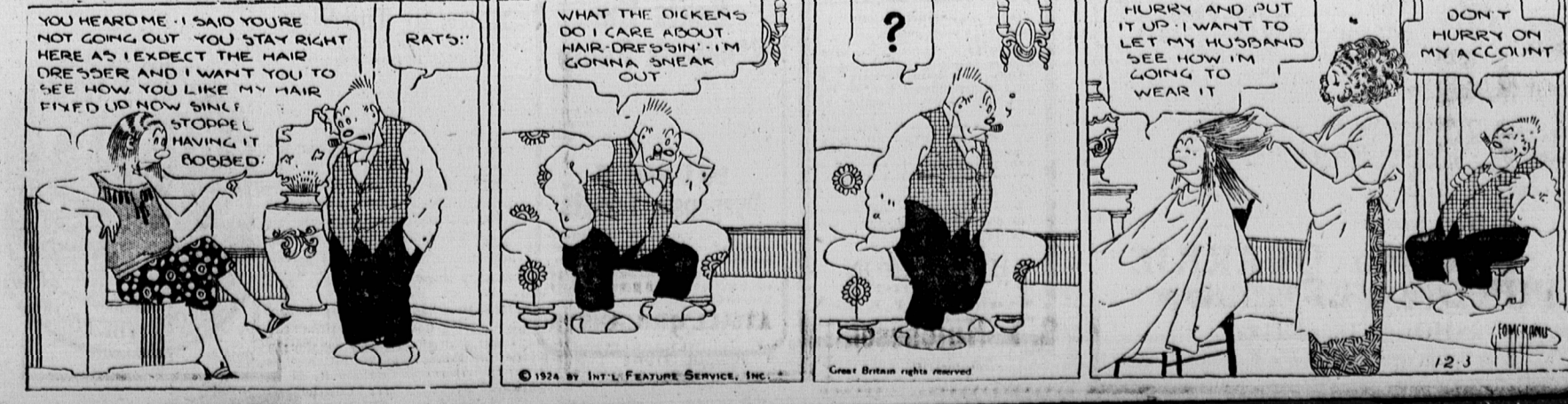
