#### Restoration Of German Monarchy Is Idle Dream

#### Adolf Hitler, Reichfuehrer, In Anniversary Address At Munich Says Old Order Gone Forever.

MUNICH, Germany, Feb. 24.—The heavy hand and shouting voice of Adolf Hitler sought to banish forever today all thought of the return of a monarch to the German Reich.  
"To fools who still dream of a restored regime," Hitler shouted, "I say that what once was can never be again. You will never return to power."  
The huge Munich town hall echoed with cheers from an assembly of old Nazi campaigners and eager young aspirants to Nazi honors gathered to celebrate the 15th anniversary of the day Hitler proclaimed the Nazi gospel in a Munich beer cellar.

#### Tornado Hits Kansas Town

WICHITA, Kas., Feb. 24.—A tornado ripped through the north-western suburban district of Wichita today, injuring about 12 persons and damaging numerous residences.  
A heavy hail storm struck the city after the twister.  
A tornado struck at the edge of the city and pursued an erratic course through a suburban district, dipping and striking at intervals, the tornado was dissipated after wreaking the greatest damage to the northwest.  
Many residences were unroofed and farm buildings were wrecked. It was not believed anyone was killed.

#### Attack System Of Dole

#### Century-wide Demonstrations Throughout Great Brit.

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)  
LONDON, Feb. 24.—A hundred thousand persons participating in country-wide demonstrations against "dole" restrictions heard proposals today for a national one-day strike in protest against the Government.  
At the largest of the dole meetings at Aberkerrig, Glamorgan-shire, 60,000 approved a resolution urging that workers consider a one-day strike in an effort to force the Government to withdraw all existing unemployment benefit regulations and create new scales of payment.

#### Large Gatherings

More than 30 assemblies were held in South Wales, including one at Tonypandy where 20,000 were gathered. In London, James Maxton, Laborite member of Parliament, addressed crowds in Hyde Park.  
The protests were directed against the family means test, the new regulations which cut payments to unemployed heads of families if their dependents are earning anything and vice versa. The Government recently restored general cuts in unemployment benefits.

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—With business of Parliament speeding along at a fast clip the question engaging minds of political observers in Ottawa is whether or not this fact forebodes an early election. Coupled with that question is acceptance or otherwise of the invitation to the Prime Minister to attend the King's silver jubilee in London, May 6.  
If the election is to be early in the spring it would seem impossible for the Prime Minister to accept, in which case it has been rumored that he would be represented in London by either Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Borden, war-time Prime Minister of Canada, or Rt. Hon. Sir George Perley, senior member of the Government and one time Canadian High Commissioner in London.

#### Death Of Mrs. Sarah Jane Dunbar

TORONTO, Feb. 24.—Mrs. Sarah Jane Dunbar, mother of W. H. V. Dunbar of Charlottetown, P. E. I., died here Saturday afternoon. She was 79 years old.  
Mrs. Dunbar came here from England, where she was born, about 65 years ago. She lived for many years in Guelph, Ont., and four years ago made her home with her daughter, Mrs. T. A. Robinson, in Toronto.  
Besides her daughter, and W. H. V. Dunbar, another son, R. C. Dunbar, of Guelph, survives. A funeral service will be held tomorrow from the home of her son-in-law, Dr. T. A. Robinson here.

#### Austrian Statesmen Are Well Guarded In London

LONDON, Feb. 24.—Austria's Chancellor and Foreign Minister assured of France's support in their insistence on Austria's sovereignty and her equality with other nations in international negotiations, arrived in London today for talks with British ministers on the means of preserving the peace of Europe.  
Sir John Simon, Foreign Secretary, headed the official party which welcomed Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg, his foreign minister, Baron Egon Berger-Waldenegg, and their staff today for talks with British ministers on the means of preserving the peace of Europe.  
The importance of the Anglo-Austrian talks tomorrow and Tuesday is emphasized by well-informed observers here, who remark that Vienna may be regarded as being in some measure the political and diplomatic keystone of central Europe at present.

#### Paraguay Resigns From League Of Nations

ASUNCION, Paraguay, Feb. 24.—Paraguay has quit the League of Nations.  
A note cabled to Geneva at five p. m. yesterday, Chancellor Luis Riart announced, notified the League of the Asuncion Government's withdrawal.  
That was Paraguay's answer to the League's demand that she accept its proposals to end the 2 1/2-year war in the Chaco, or incur the League's wrath and possibly punitive measures as an aggressor nation waging an illegal war.  
The three months period for acceptance of the League's proposals expired today. Bolivia, Paraguay's adversary in the Chaco, has already accepted them without reservations.  
Decision to quit the League came after the Cabinet met to consider the matter, and after Chancellor Riart conferred with President Eusebio Ayala.  
Under the League covenant, Paraguay's resignation cannot become immediately effective. She remains nominally subject.

#### Loss Of Life And Property In Storm Swept Maritimes

HALIFAX, Feb. 24.—A winter gale whistled along the Atlantic seaboard today, leaving death and destruction in its wake.  
Heavy sleet lashed Nova Scotia from Yarmouth to Cape North, while Prince Edward Island was blanketed with snow.  
Working late in his sail-loft near the village of Five Houses, on Nova Scotia's south shore, Robert Creaser started home to his wife and three children as the storm blew up. His frozen body was found by a search party today on the shore, and belief was expressed that he had lost his way and wandered until he became exhausted.

#### Police Probe \$25,000 Fire At Shelburne

SHELBURNE, N. S., Feb. 24.—Fire believed to be of incendiary origin destroyed three buildings in the heart of Shelburne's business district today with a loss estimated at \$25,000.  
Breaking out in Mrs. Leslie Hipson's large wooden building which housed a bakery, a dance hall, a pool room and a bowling alley, the flames spread rapidly to a garage owned by the same woman.  
Later a building containing William Hipson's barber shop and pool room, and J. Fred McQuibban's jewelry store was razed.  
Nine cars were saved from the blazing garage by Royal Canadian Mounted Police but two others were burned.  
Police did not disclose their reason for suspecting that the fire was started by an incendiarist.

#### Flies Home To Visit Father

Typical of the "mercy flights" being made locally during the past few weeks was a speedy journey made on Saturday by Miss Pat Collins, of New York, who arrived home to visit her father, Dr. Collins of Vernon River, who is seriously ill.  
Miss Collins left New York on Friday and arrived in Moncton Saturday afternoon at 3.30. She took the Canadian Airways plane, piloted by Junior Jones at 3.45 and arrived in Charlottetown at 5 o'clock. She transferred to the moth plane with Pilot Fowler and leaving here at 5.15, arrived in Vernon River a quarter of an hour later.

#### Labatt In Bermuda

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Feb. 24.—Far from the scene of his abduction, John S. Labatt requested official aid to curb publicity about him as he arrived here today in search of complete rest and privacy.  
Last passenger to leave the customs enclosure after disembarking from the Canadian National liner Lady Rodney, the healthy London, Ont., brewer was greeted by his wife and two children, who have been in Bermuda for some time.  
He drove away with them in a carriage to the private residence where they and Mrs. Labatt's parents have been guests.

#### Artist Passes

#### Ships Race To Rescue

#### North Atlantic, Bay Biscay & Mediterranean Swept By Gales.

Five ships sent out distress calls Sunday as gales continued to lash the North Atlantic and the Bay of Biscay and swept into the Mediterranean.  
A Greek steamer believed to be the Delphoi, drifting helplessly with damaged engines and the British freighter Hillcroft, with a broken rudder, were reported in trouble in almost the same position, off Cape Finisterre, Spain, in the Bay of Biscay where four ships sent out SOS calls last week.

#### IN DISTRESS

The United States shipping board freighter Oakman out of Mobile, Ala., was reported in distress though in no immediate danger from a loss of rudder 700 miles northwest of the Azores, with the S. S. City of Newport News standing by.  
An SOS from the Italian steamer Speitro in the Mediterranean was picked up by Casablanca radio station.  
The disabled British vessel, Ottinge, managed that assistance was "urgent" when the tow line to a tug taking her to port parted. The Ottinge was one of the seven ships

#### Avert Strike Riot

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Feb. 24.—Bloodshed was averted in Martinique's general strike by the arrival of three French warships in Port De France harbor, according to private advices received here today.  
Thousands of angered sugar workers marched on the capital of the French island Friday following announcement of a 20 per cent reduction in wages but the sight of the warships cooled their tempers.  
Shortly after reaching the city the mob dispersed quietly without any serious disorders.  
First word of the strike was brought here yesterday by aeroplane passengers arriving from Martinique.  
Messages today stated that Governor Afaasa had the situation "under control" among the workers of the French civil code in operation there by another stating that negotiations toward a settlement of the sugar walkout were proceeding peacefully.  
Martinique, a French possession since 1635, has a population of 234,695 packed into its 385 square miles.

#### Que. Farmers Seek Aid Under F.C.A.

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—Under the Farmers Creditors Arrangement Act 65 farmers in the province of Quebec have had their debts reduced approximately \$100,000, it was explained in a statement issued today by Minister of Finance E. N. Rhodes. The result was up to Feb. 16 and a large number of other cases were before the official receivers, the statement said.  
It is understood there was some apprehension as to the success of the act in Quebec because the French civil code in operation there is different from the laws of other provinces.
