ARRIVES HOME

After his Musical Studies in Montreal.

A THRILLING INCIDENT On Board the Campana and an Accident Narrowly Averted.

Yesterday afternoon a GUARDIAN representative had a pleasant conversation with Mr. Fred Morris who arrived by the Campana a few days ago, from Montreal where he is studying music. Those who are acquainted with Mr. Morris know of his ability as a musician and any comment along that line would be superfluous. In the conversation the representative learned that on the way to this port the Campana nearly went ashore and but for the ability of the Captain possibly another casualty would have to be recorded. The fact is that before the officers were aware the ship was within a boat length of the rocks. Realizing that there was no time to lose, the Captain put the helm hard aport and reversed one of the screws and by his timely action the possible loss of the steamer was averted. The incident happened on Thursday morning between Bay Chaleur and Grande River. The passengers were not alarmed and seemed to rather enjoy the little incident. Mr. Morris says that it was realistic. He was

standing on the deck and noticed the rocks at the same moment as the officers did. The fog had fallen very suddenly and was very thick. A few moments before it was quite clear. Apart from that unpleasant moment the passage was a delightful one and those who admired the Captain previously were loud in his praise through the remainder of the journey.

Mr. Morris is continuing his studies under Dr. Konigsberg a Russian by birth. The Konigsberg Piano school has already gained for itself a continental reputation. Next year in recognition of his ability Mr. Morris will be appointed to the position of assistant teacher and he is now preparing with that end in view. In referring to the musical season Mr. Morris reports that "Montreal has enjoyed one in advance of former years. One of the principal features has been the presence of several pianists who gave recitals all of whom I contrived to meet including the world renowned little pianist, Vladimir de Packmann who presented me with a very nice photo and autograph. I also had the pleasure of the company of Arthur Friedheim for several hours and he expressed himself satisfied that I would attain as high a position as I could desire as a pianist if I continued my present system of hard work under Dr. Konigsberg who was a fellow student with Friedheim under the Abbe Liszt."

Although attaining such a large measure of success Mr. Morris says that if he was starting out and had his choice of a profession he would never select that of a musician. In the first place he says one must be adapted to it from every point of view, and then it takes eight years to take a full course.

As a writer of music Mr. Morris has attained an enviable pinnacle. Among his productions which are receiving a world wide reputation are "The Heeselt Study," and "The Elfen Tanz and Waltz." In the event of giving a recital Mr. Morris will place on the program, "The Erl Konig," Schubert, Liszt.
