Hart Scores Kayoe Win In Third Round

HALIFAX, Feb. 6.—(CP)—Kid Hart of Moncton was too tough for Glace Bay's Ronnie McNeil in their boxing bout here tonight and won by a technical knockout in the third round.

Hart, eight pounds lighter than the 142-pound McNeil, was staggered twice in the first round and fell to one knee in the third. Nevertheless he belted the Glace Bay youth about the face and body until McNeil's handlers climbed through the ropes to stop the fight.

McNeil started fast and his first punch, a long, hard right bouncer, hit clean across the ring. Hart came back only to run into a fusillade of punches that had him tottering. McNeil won the round by a good margin.

In a savage exchange on the ropes in the third, Hart slipped to one knee but came up fast. He started to punch with all his weight behind the smashes. McNeil dodged and duck but couldn't get away. A series of blows followed him but he came up at the count of eight.

Hart kept boring in and had McNeil groggy. Gussie McLellan, the Glace Bay boy's handlers, slid through the ropes and stepped between the fighters, giving Hart a technical knockout.

"He's a kid with a future," McLellan said on the way to the dressing room. "I didn't want to see him badly hurt."

Nova Scotia Boxers Fare Badly In Boston Tourney

BOSTON, Feb. 6.—(CP)—A combination of hard luck and tough opposition proved too much tonight for visiting Nova Scotia boxers at the Irish-America Athletic Association of Boston opened its season with an international tournament.

Clifford Mombourquette of Halifax lost a hectic three-round decision to Eddie Deangelis of Boston. For three rounds the Canadian and American entrants in the 112-pound class stood toe to toe and slugged it out. Deangelis' stiffer punches forced Mombourquette to back off against the ropes. The Nova Scotian did well to weather a terrific third-round barrage by Deangelis which enabled the home boy to win the decision.

Jack Delaney, Halifax entrant in the 118-pound class, got a tough break. After having a slim edge on Boston in two rounds, he suffered a deep cut over his left eye. The presiding physician refused to allow Delaney to continue and the 112-pounder was dumped for the full count by a sharp right cross.
