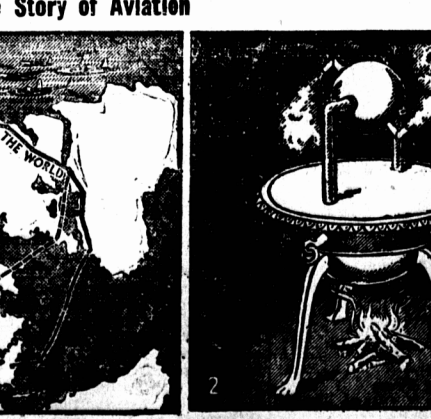

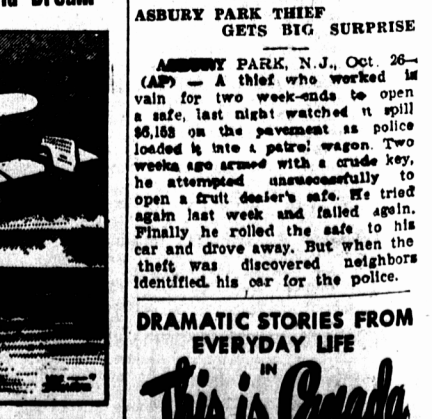
came the dirigible with motor and rudder, but the first flight on home-made wings was made in 1853. Jean Marie Le Bris, French coa captain, glided an eighth of a mile in a machine patterned after an albatross. John C. Montgomery rode air currents over the hills of Otay, Cal., as America's first glider pilot, in 1894.



The basic principle of jet propulsion, now revolutionizing aviation, was first demonstrated by Hero of Alexandria in 150 B. C. Hero constructed a hollow sphere with two opposing curved jets. Steam generated inside, escaping through the jets, made the sphere revolve.



The culmination of 14 years of secret research, his first hydrogen-burning engine powered a British fighter in 1941. It was later given to the United States and reproduced by the General Electric Corp.



(4) Birdmen of other countries were quick to follow the success of the Wrights. Alberto Santos-Dumont, Brazilian balloon maker, made the first successful flight in Europe, in 1906. Louis Bleriot in 1907 was the first to be successful with a monoplane and in 1909 proved its worth by crossing the English Channel. His flight was hailed by the world as a major accomplishment in aviation.
