"If you would like to, Gay."

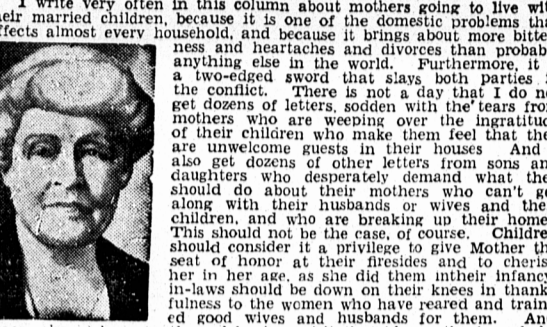

MOTHERS SHOULD NOT LIVE WITH MARRIED CHILDREN

It is Better That They be Kept in a Home of Their Own Where They Can Continue Living Their Own Lives



I write very often in this column about mothers going to live with their married children, because it is one of the domestic problems that affects almost every household, and because it brings about more bitterness and heartaches and divorces than probably anything else in the world. Furthermore, it is a two-edged sword that slays both parties in the contest. There is not a day that I do not get dozens of letters, sadder with the tears from mothers who are weeping over the ingratitude of their children who make them feel that they are unwelcome guests in their homes. And I also get dozens of other letters from sons and daughters who desperately demand what they should do about their mothers who can't get along with their husbands or wives and their children and who are breaking up their homes. This should not be the case, of course. Children should consider it a privilege to give Mother the seat of honor at their firesides and to cherish her in her age, as she did them in their infancy. It is the woman's nature is human nature and the chief sufferer is always the mother.

That is why I am always urging mothers not to go to live with their married children unless it is a dire financial necessity. It is of the older woman's happiness that I am thinking more than the younger ones. For it is only too sadly true that an old woman in a young house is not only a disruptive influence, but she is miserable herself.

To begin with, old people are as hard to transplant as old trees. They cannot strike roots down in an alien soil. In her own home Mother has been a person of importance. She has her own friends, her cronies with whom she had everything in common. When she was asked out to tea or dinner it was because people wanted her. I.T. here.

But when she goes to live in her children's homes, she is nobody. She is only asked about because she is John's or Mary's mother, and she knows she is regarded as a bore and a burden. She doesn't even fit into the back seat of the car; one too many at the table when they give a dinner party; somebody who always has to be entertained and amused.

Don't think it makes Mother happy for her dutiful children to give her the best room in the house and say: "Now, you have nothing to do the balance of your life but just to hold your hands in idleness."

To a woman who has worked hard all of her life, who has been busy child-bearing and child-rearing and making a comfortable home, idleness is a torture. She doesn't know what to do with herself. She has no facts nor hobbies with which to divert herself, and she is as restless and dissatisfied as a caged old tiger.

The reason so many old women are peevish and fretful and hard to get along with is just because they are so bored with having nothing to do.

THE COOK'S CORNER

GINGERALE MARSHMALLOW SALAD.

32 marshmallows
2 tsp. fruit juice
2 cups gingerale
1 cup mayonnaise
2 cups peaches
1 1/2 cup pineapple
1-2 cup maraschino cherries
1 cup whipped cream

Place marshmallows and fruit juice in saucepan and heat slowly, folding over and over until marshmallows are half melted. Remove from heat and continue folding until mixture is smooth and fluffy. Chill. Blend in gingerale and mayonnaise. Add chopped, drained fruits and lastly fold in whipped cream.

Pour in freezing tray of automatic refrigerator and place ice cube form in tray. Freeze at quick-deep degree possible, from 3 to 4 hours or until salad is solid. Before serving quickly dip bottom of tray in warm water and with the aid of a knife unmold salad cubes on crisp lettuce cups. Serves 8.

GINGER COOKIES

1 cup butter
1 cup molasses
1 cup sugar
2 tsp. baking soda
2 tsp. milk
1 egg
1 tsp. ginger
Flour enough to roll

Cream butter, gradually add sugar, creaming well, then add beaten eggs, molasses and milk. Sift flour with baking soda and ginger, add to first mixture (you will need 3 or 4 cups flour) and roll thin. Sprinkle with sugar and bake in moderate oven—350 degrees F.
