### NOT TWO SETTS OF POLES.

Objection has been taken to the plan of city ownership of a lighting plant, that it would involve further cumbering our streets with poles. There is nothing in this objection. It is already provided that the city shall take over any poles in use by the Company, and that the Company shall use these poles and pay a reasonable rental for the use of the same.

In the Act of 1898 incorporating the Charlottetown Light and Power Company Limited, section 31 provides as follows:

"31. Should the Mayor and City Council during the continuance of the Company's franchise determine to erect poles for the carrying of wires, the Company shall make use of such poles, paying a reasonable toll therefor. In the event of any dispute arising as to the reasonableness of such toll, the amount thereof to be fixed by arbitration in the same manner as is provided in case the Mayor and City Council determine to purchase the charter, plant, and all rights, privileges and franchises upon and after the expiration of twenty years from the completion of the said four miles of railway, or tramway, and in such case the Mayor and City Council shall take over any poles then erected and owned by the Company within the City and Common of Charlottetown at a valuation to be fixed in like way."

All of which makes it entirely clear that should the City Council decide to erect a lighting plant, there will be no necessity for or possibility of further poles being required on the street. And few will doubt that it would be a good thing for the City to own and control the poles that have been set up, in order that they may be placed where they are required, or removed to more desirable locations if any should be found to be wrongly or inconveniently placed.

### THE WAR.

On February 8 the second year of the Russo-Japanese war was entered upon. During the first year the results were wholly in favor of Japan. Here were the victories in all of the many great battles. Korea was occupied and the Russians driven out of its territory; Port Arthur besieged and captured; the Russian fleet in the east almost wholly destroyed; the Russian armies driven out of southern Manchuria and northward to the Hun River, 250 miles from Port Arthur; a railway nearly completed through the length of Korea from Fusan to the Yalu River and thence to Liao Yang; the gauge of the Russian railway from Port Arthur to Liao Yang adapted to Japanese rolling stock, so completing the lines of transportation for the Mikado's forces to the front. The Russian Baltic squadron is at present hiding in the Indian Ocean. Will it be able to proceed, defeat Togo and restore to Russia the mastery of the eastern seas? Upon that bare possibility—hardly more than a possibility—hang grave issues. Otherwise the close of the first year of the war sees Russia greatly weakened by unrest and insurrection at home, but still capable of sustaining a tremendous conflict in Manchuria when the warmer weather comes.
