THE PEOPLE THE QUEEN OF SHEBA RULED.

Towards the end of the eighteenth century Bruce, the great explorer, came home and told wonderful stories of the feasts and customs of the natives in a land he had visited while searching for the source of the Nile. This was Abyssinia, and Bruce related how, among other things, the natives were in the habit of catching elephants by coming close behind and hamstringing them, while another pleasant habit of theirs was to cut steaks out of live animals and to eat them raw.

These stories naturally aroused a good deal of disbelief and ridicule. A satirist, borrowing the name of a traveller, "Baron Munchausen," wrote a series of caricature tales which have ever since been quoted as the very type and acme of absurd impossibility. Yet Bruce's account of Abyssinia has been proved quite accurate.

The Abyssinian is a Christian, his ancestors having embraced Christianity in 330 A.D. He worshipped in a church in the Western fashion, whilst his legal system is said to be based on the Justinian code, and he has a system of compulsory education for all male children over the age of twelve, and a Bank of Abyssinia.

These Abyssinian envoys have been on a mission to Europe, and are now on this continent, to solicit a continuation of the friendship of the Allied and Associated Powers.

Their rulers claim descent from Menelik, son of Solomon and the Queen Sheba, and the Abyssinians have been a free people from even earlier days. Abyssinia is a fertile and temperate country, which produces much cotton, excellent coffee (which derives its name from the Kaffa province) wheat, maize, barley, rye, pepper, and sugar-cane, abundant fruit, vegetables and timber, and supports vast herds of cattle and vast flocks of sheep and goats.
