ECHOES OF THE CORONATION CELEBRATION.

Although the weather was not altogether auspicious in London on Thursday the great state ceremonial of the Coronation seems to have passed off most prosperously.

The success of the Coronation as a great and significant historical and spectacular event will be a source of satisfaction not only to those in high station who were the immediate participants and spectators in London, but to the millions outside the big metropolis and throughout the Empire who were patriotically interested therein.

In Charlottetown the celebration was one which will long be remembered, especially by the multitude of young persons who were spectators or participants in the day's events. In the churches the services were very largely attended and most impressive.

It was very capably arranged and marshalled, everything moving like clockwork, and formed a highly interesting and pleasing spectacular display, of which the city and all who took part may be justly proud.

The presence of H. M. C. S. Niobe in our port and the participation of the gallant young men of the Canadian navy for the first time in an imperial celebration in our city added features of rare interest. Charlottetown was rarely privileged in that regard.

The people of Prince Edward Island have always been devotedly loyal to the Sovereign and to our British connection and institutions, and yesterday's celebration of the Coronation of the King and Queen afforded abundant evidence that the affectionate devotion of our people young and old and of all classes and creeds has increased rather than diminished with the passing years.

ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION

That St. Andrews was once the centre of religious life for our Catholic people is becoming only a tradition but the name MacDonald yet remains pre-eminent in the Catholic hierarchy.

At St. Andrew's Church on Sunday, June 18th, Rev. Peter F. MacDonald, B. A., celebrated his first mass.

Seldom has St. Andrews seen as large a congregation many assembling from other parishes.

A most eloquent and instructive sermon was preached by Rev. R. B. MacDonald, P. P., Souris. The young priest gave his blessing, individually to the large congregation, the first to receive it being his aged father, now in his 87th year.

The following address was read by W. J. MacDonald, Mt. Stewart, and the purse was presented by Ivan Walsh.

To Rev. Peter F. MacDonald: Rev. Dear Father:—Today we behold another of the most talented sons of this parish raised to the dignity of the Holy Priesthood. It indeed affords us inexpressible joy to know that God has spared you during the years of your theological studies and has permitted you to return to your island home, to offer up your first High Mass on that altar before which you and your ancestors have so often met in adoration.

It is unnecessary here to dwell on your record as a student, suffice to say, that in the long list of eminent scholars who have gone forth from this Province to pursue their studies or theology, you have attained a rank among the most brilliant, thus affording a conclusive proof of your ability to fill the high office to which God has called you.

It is therefore, we may say, our duty to unite in offering you our heartiest congratulations on your success, and though the scene of your ministrations may be in distant lands you may rest assured that our prayers and good wishes will follow you.
