RICH ELDERLY WIDOW WEDS HER HIRED MAN

BLOOMINGTON, ILL., Sept. 17.—Louis Schauers, a day laborer, aged twenty-five was employed by a cement contractor to assist in laying sidewalks. One of the jobs he was put on was to lay walks around the home of Mrs. Mary Collins Boyle, a wealthy widow who lived alone in a large house with no other company but servants, not being on friendly terms with her relatives.

Schauers went up to the house on several occasions for a drink of water and thus became acquainted with the widow. She finally gave him employment as hostler and gardener. One day after he had been there for several weeks Schauers and the old woman went to Geneva and were married. Before going she drew out a large sum of money which she had in the bank, telling the cashier she was going to Michigan.

Nine days after her marriage she died. Nephews demanded an investigation, suspecting poison, but medical experts said she had died of heart disease.

Then Schauers took steps to secure possession of her property and although he was opposed by a number of the woman's nephews he was appointed administrator of the estate. After several weeks of legal proceedings the lawyers got together and arranged a compromise. Schauers gave a quit-claim deed to the real estate and received \$12,080 in cash. The nephews proved that Mrs. Boyle had promised them all of her property after her death.

COURT FORGETS TO EXECUTE MAN

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 17.—Two years forgotten in San Quentin Prison has been the lot of August Geber, former soldier, palmist and phrenologist. Two years is a long time when regarded from certain standpoints, but Geber made no complaint. If he had been forgotten for twenty times two years he probably would have remained silent, the reason of his silence being that to speak would have meant death.

By some queer freak of official book-keeping or pigeonholing, August Geber, who tried to wipe out an entire family on July 10, 1904, and succeeded in murdering only one member thereof, has been allowed to breathe the air of the world, although judicially his life was declared forfeit eight years ago.

NOT COMING ON AS A FIGHTER

PARIS, Sept. 17.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader, who is staying at a quiet little hotel here, says she is not disturbed over the reports that she may possibly be barred from entering the United States. She said: "I visited the United States twice before, the last time two years ago, and have only the kindest recollections of the courtesy and cordiality which I met with there."

Replying to a question in regard to the purpose of her visit, Mrs. Pankhurst made it clear that her object was not to talk of the militant propaganda. She said: "I intend to describe and explain the position and aims of our movement in order that American women may understand what we are doing, and why and where we stand. They cannot learn that from the English newspapers, which, as if by a preconcerted agreement, limit their reports to militancy only, passing over all our other work, ignoring our crowded meetings like those which we hold every week at the London pavilion music hall, never reporting the speeches made, even by men like Israel Zangwill, and never recognizing or work on two great questions of the day—white slavery and contagious diseases. I want to describe all this work in America."

AWARD IN IMPORTANT CASE

QUEBEC, Sept. 18.—In the expropriation proceedings between the Federal government and the Quebec Seminary re the Seminary property at Sillery wanted by the Trans-Atlantic railway, the Court has awarded the Seminary \$101,000 with interest and costs. The government offered \$60,000, the seminary asked \$190,000.

NEW BRIDGE.—While the new bridge at Cardigan river is being built, a temporary structure has been erected across the river for the convenience of the public. The temporary bridge, which has been built right alongside the original bridge where the work of reconstruction is going on, is sufficiently wide and stable to permit of its use by vehicular traffic as well as pedestrians. The new bridge will be the first of its kind to be erected in this province. Its peculiarity being in the fact that it is to have a concrete roadway, instead of the ordinary plank roadways that have been used in every other case hitherto. The concrete will be laid down six inches thick, and the superstructure of the bridge will consist of two eighty-foot steel spans. Alongside the roadway, and apart from it there will run a footpath, also of concrete, and about four feet wide, for the use of foot passengers. This bridge is to be in the nature of an experiment, which if it proves successful, will lead to similar structures when occasion arises in the future.

A few years ago they had Gasolene lights installed, now they are having the buildings and streets lighted by electricity. The water power is supplied from the mills owned by Messrs G. E. Leard & Son. We expect to have the system in operation by the last of September. Later on Sewerage will be put in the houses. Crapaud is now one of the leading villages on the island and is destined for greater things still, for with its beautiful location, modern improvements, and lately its wealth of fox ranches, it is attracting hosts of retired farmers and other people rich in this world's goods by their good luck in the said Fox Business.

TOO GOOD TO BE TRUE.—In connection with the formation of the latest fox company to enter the field the Royal Silver Black Fox Company, which, as stated in yesterday's Guardian, has been floated and incorporated in Massachusetts, U. S. A., Dr. S. A. Nicholson, a P. E. Islander, who was instrumental in the organization of the concern, told a Guardian representative that the only difficulty experienced in getting the capital of the company subscribed was the disinclination of the American investors to credit the large percentage of dividends that were being offered by fox companies. The idea of a return of forty per cent for their investments was considered by these stolid New Englanders too good to be true. Said Dr. Nicholson: "The best thinking business men and solid business men thought there was something wrong with concerns offering such inducements. They were satisfied to get eight or ten per cent return for their money, but the idea of getting forty or sixty per cent, was too much for them. They were scared of such a proposition, and would not touch it, thinking that the stock was watered, that something was totally wrong."
