Even Valentines Bear Some Signs There's A War On

Much Mystery About Custom's Origin But Missives for Friday Have Imprint of Trend of Times.

Khaki-clad cupid coyly covets on many comic and sentimental valentines of wartime 1941. Other cards bear picture of sailors, soldiers and airmen, separately and in groups. Patriotic pictures show bulldogs, flags—various devices. And others stick to old-fashioned lace and verse, with little or no hint of war in their makeup for Feb. 14. Men in the forces kept sales staffs busy with their demands for cards. Specially designed for men on service and serious valentines, a wholesaler reported. This year's business in valentines of all kinds topped a five-year trend to bigger sales. People seemed to be trying to "buck one another up" with cards, a dealer observed. "Friendship valentines" conveying good will and friendly affection were unexpectedly popular, and serious valentines of almost all types sold in great numbers. The Canadian Press learned. "You can always sell to a sweet heart," said a publisher of cards, who reported "spirited sales" generally. He added children's valentines are more popular every year. Valentines for children to send their parents and grandparents, cards for adults to send children, are printed in ever-increasing quantities.

WHY ST. VALENTINE'S? Origin of the whole thing is obscure. "Valentine" is the name of a confusing number of saints and priests. The two best known were a priest of Rome and a bishop of Terni, both lived in the same period—the days of Claudius II, Emperor of Rome—both died the same day, and both were buried on the Flaminian Way, so their biographical paths are confusingly crossed. They were both reputedly buried on the eve of the feast of Lupercalia, a pagan festival honoring Faunus, an ancient rural god, and it is believed the execution of Valentine—or of the Valentines—became a part of the wild celebrations. Later the pagan festival, with so many others, changed to a Christian festival, as the celebration of a saint's day. For nearly 1,800 years England has observed the anniversary of the Saint's passing, in more or less inappropriate form. The origin of the beribboned love-note and the sentimental verse is traced to the February 14th feast of the Roman at which men chose partners by lot. That practice survived in England to the 17th century, according to the diarist, Samuel Pepys.

RETURNING TO FAVOR Valentines slumped after the First Great War: from the pinnacle of popularity they had reached earlier. In the days of Charles Dickens they were popular, and the novelist tells of Sam Weller's laborious composition of a "valentine" to an Ipswich housemaid. Mr. Pickwick's madcap manservant confused the whole issue by signing his master's name to the outpourings of his own heart. But within the last decade there has been renewed interest in Valentine cards—an interest apparently intensified by the war, as people are buying more cards of serious sentiment and less of the jeering and mocking variety of earlier generations.
