### WEDNESDAY

**HANDSOME DONATION.** Mr. Phelar yesterday gave a handsome donation of \$1200 to the Charlottetown Hospital. This enables that institution to procure the X-Ray Machine which has so long been desired.

**DIED IN WEST.** Mr. Fred Egan, Charlottetown, yesterday received a telegram stating that his brother Daniel had met his death in a fire in Macoun hotel in Betswan, Saskatchewan. No particulars were given. The late Mr. Egan left Charlottetown about six years ago for the west, where he has since resided with his brother, Mr. Joseph Egan. He visited his home two years ago. Since returning to the west he has worked as a telephone lineman with several companies. Besides his parents two brothers, Alfred and Fred, of the P. E. I., and four sisters, Mrs. E. P. Maddigan, Mrs. D. Macanis, and Misses Annie and Katie Egan all of this city are left to mourn.

**VITAL STATISTICS.** The Registrar-General of this Province (Hon. Murdoch MacInnon) in his report under "The Vital Statistics Act" for the year ending Dec. 31st, last, states that the returns for the year show the registration of 1,628 births, (840 males and 788 females), 484 deaths (495 males and 488 females), and 478 marriages. Of the births, 454 occurred in Queen's County, 234 in King's, 174 in Prince, 209 in St. John's, 332 in the city and 276 in the county. Of the deaths, 218 (123 males and 95 females) occurred in Queen's, 125 (120 males and 115 females) in King's, 372 (189 males and 183 females) in Prince, and in Charlottetown, 128 (63 males and 65 females). In regard to marriages, the largest number, 225, were contracted in Queen's County, while there were 181 performed in Prince County, and 72 in King's.

### THURSDAY

**POLICE PAID.** The premises of Mrs. Annie Coyle, King Street, were raided on Tuesday for intoxicating liquors. A small quantity of beer was found and taken for analysis.

**DAYLIGHT ROBBERY.** A bold robbery was committed in Charlottetown yesterday when a log consigned to Messrs. Davis & Fryer, pork packers, was stolen from a car at the railway siding by the pork factory. The pork was "missed" after the freight had been transferred from the car to the factory the shipment being found to be short. The manager telephoned to Detective Bradley, who at once took up the case and last night arrested a youth of this city on suspicion. It is thought that he took the carcass from the car, while on the factory siding, and dragged it along under the verandah of the factory to Richmond Street. Then it is further thought he took a horse and cart down to the bottom of Richmond Street and loaded the hog and conveyed it to a pork buyer to whom he succeeded in selling it. The case comes up before His Honour at the Police Court this morning.
