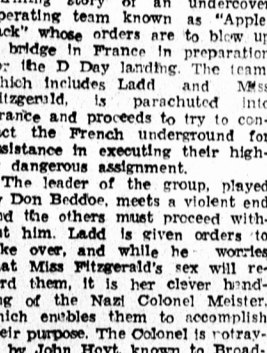

to be impossible this spring. "The roads can't all be graded this spring but I suggest the Minister take one or two machines and ditch them out and round them off as quickly as possible, before he starts grading roads."

Mr. Matheson wondered whether the estimates for road maintenance had been cut in order to make a better showing on ordinary account. The people did not think much of this kind of financing.

He referred to one road, ten miles in length, connecting Hunter River with Rustico which was probably unique in the Dominion. A grant of \$100,000 had been given by the Dominion to build it, and all the Provincial Government had to do was to grade it.

He urged that a system of road maintenance be established by appointing responsible men to patrol a section of road and be responsible for taking care of freshets by directing the water into the gutters.

Farmers Handicapped

He complimented the Minister of Agriculture on his address, and went on to speak of farming conditions, which he said were uncertain at the present time owing to lack of consistent policies at Ottawa.

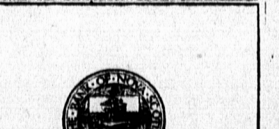
He stated that the Federal Minister of Agriculture with regard to hog prices, a few days later the selling price was lifted on feeds. Barley and oats went up. Mixed feeds will follow and there will be more profit in growing hogs than there was last year.

Dairying has been one of the most disappointing phases of the agricultural picture, Mr. Matheson said. It would be of much help if the Dominion Government could arrive at some degree of accuracy in regard to the cost of butter in recent years, due to the fact farmers are not just getting enough to produce it.

He was informed that many of the co-operative butter factories have been the victims of a poor bookkeeping setup. Some have suggested to the Department that it take action similar to that taken in connection with the credit unions when they started. There was an auditor appointed to go around and audit the books. Something like that could be done to help the different factories inaugurate a proper accounting setup.

Also, he believed, the factories should be assisted in establishing cold storage plants.

As UN Takes Up Palestine Problem
