

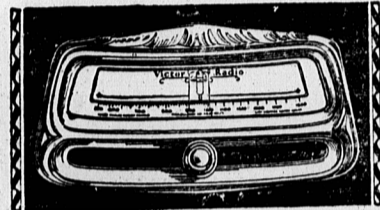
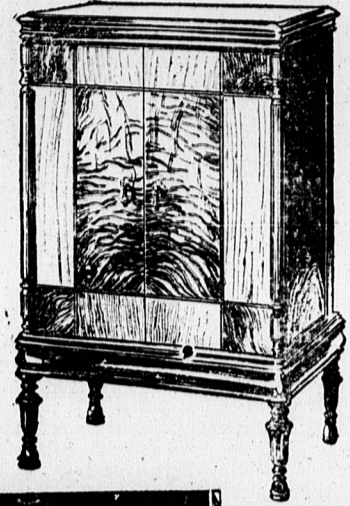

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Air Mail

An experimental air mail service in which the Maritime Provinces will be interested is to start on Monday next, the 9th instant, between Montreal, Quebec, Moncton and Saint John. According to the schedule which has been approved a plane will leave Montreal daily, except Sunday, at 8.15 a. m., and is due to arrive at Moncton at 1.20 p. m. This mail will connect with the Island train from Moncton, which is due to arrive in Charlottetown at 11.20 p. m. This service will practically only be of benefit to this Province so far as air letters are concerned, coming from Toronto and points west in which cases such letters would be considerably advanced in delivery.

On the west-bound trip the air plane will leave Moncton at 7.00 a. m., arriving in Montreal at noon and letters will accordingly be delivered in the afternoon, deliveries making a saving of at least half a day and there would be similar gains in letters for points west of Montreal, but it must be understood that this air mail service would only be of advantage in the case of air mail letters leaving the Province by the afternoon trains, namely train 41 leaving Charlottetown at 2.00, or train 206 leaving Summerside at 3.00 p. m.

The service is purely experimental, and only such mail will be carried as is prepaid at the air mail rate of 5c for the first ounce and 10c for each succeeding ounce or fraction thereof. This service should be kept in mind by business men or other residents of Summerside, Charlottetown and points east and south of Charlottetown who are anxious to make a saving of time in the receipt or delivery of their mail.

OUTLINED BUSY YEAR—At a meeting of the directors of the Prince Edward Island Potato Growers' Association this week an interesting report of the season's activities was submitted by the secretary, Mr. Boulter, who stated that at the 1st of December this year, of the 1929 crop they had moved 25,000 bushels more than had been moved up to the 12th of January of the previous year's crop. The Association expected to move at least 1,000,000 bushels of the 1929 crop before the end of the seed season. At present the S. S. Solbung is loading Association potatoes at Georgetown for Florida. Two more steamers are expected before the end of the month, one for the Carolinas.

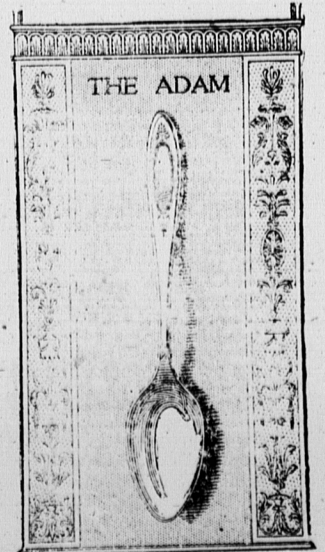
