Italian News Agency Says U. S. Peaceful

ROME, Oct. 2—(AP)—Stalini, Italian news and propaganda agency issuing a statement today telling Italians they have no reason to suppose a spirit of aggression exists in the United States policy which would cause her to go to war.

Deferring Of Introduction Of Livestock Marketing Scheme By Provincial Gov't Is Cause Of Discussion.

"WHEREAS the Sheep and Swine Marketing Scheme has apparently received unfavorable consideration at the hands of the Executive Council at their meeting on September 25th, and WHEREAS it is being referred for further consideration, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that in consideration of the possibility of the recent action of the Council being adhered to, the Board of Trade Room in Charlottetown being returned for the Province Stock Marketing Board be authorized to terminate at will the present organization, and ask the Provincial Department of Agriculture to assume responsibility for the scheme."
