NEW YORK, Nov. 5—(AP)—Making bullish capital out of the report of President Roosevelt's fact finding board on rail wage increase demands, the stock market today registered a moderate advance on expanded dealings.

The Associated Press 60-stock average rose 3 of a point to 411.1. Transactions amounting to \$19,370 shares were the largest since Sept. 25 and compared with 597,880 Monday.

Canadian stocks were fractions to a point lower. Distillers Seagram common and Walkers lost 1-2; Distillers Seagram preferred 1 1-4 to 75; Dome Mines 5-8. International Nickel and Lake Shore lost 1-8; Hollinger 1-4. Ford "A" and Brazilian Traction gained 1-8 while Imperial Oil was unchanged.

Steels, motors and aircrafts alternated as leaders until interest shifted to rails in the late proceedings.

Stocks carrying plus marks at the close included U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, General Motors, United Aircraft, Glenn Martin, Johns-Manville, Westinghouse, Union Pacific, Pennsylvania, Santa Fe, Scudder Pacific and American Tobacco. Erie pld "A" recorded a 1941 high. American Can dipped to a new year's low. Bonds were higher.

LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, Nov. 5—(CP)—There were 52 cattle, 181 sheep and lambs, 164 hogs, and 22 calves for sale on Montreal livestock markets today. Prices on all classes of livestock were steady.

Cattle were mostly common cows. Common butchers made \$4.50 to \$5.50. Canners and cutters \$4.50 to \$4.25. Common bulls \$4.50 to \$5.75. Veal calves brought \$9 to \$13. Drinkers \$6.50 to \$9.50 and grassers \$5.25 to 5.75.

Good ewes and wethers \$11. Culls and bucks \$9. Sheep \$4 to \$6.50.

Hogs were \$18 for B-1 dressed \$11.25 for B-1 alive fed and weighed and up to \$11.35 off trucks delivered. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$8.50 to \$9.50 live weight.

On the Maritime market rail grade hogs \$14.45, contract deliveries \$14.65 rail grade sows number one up to 270 pounds \$12, number one over 270 pounds \$11, number two undesirable all weights \$10. Secondary issues chiefly were in demand. Waite-Amulet and Ventures netted gains of 20 to 25 cents. Sleep Rock 13, pend Oreille closed 12 cents up and gains of 10 cents were held by Falconbridge and Sudbury Basin. Sherrit held a gain of 3 cents and Normet closed 6 cents up.

Upper Canada closed 10 cents up at 1.30. Two seniors, Dome and Lake Shore weakened 1-2—5-8 to new low prices for the year and the close was down a few cents for Central Patricia, Kerr Addison, Little Long Lac, Preston, Sullivan, Sylvanite and Wright-Hargreaves.

One copy of any such order already placed or accepted or submitted or pending acceptance in the U. S. A. and now outstanding unshipped, must be forwarded to the undersigned before November 15, 1941.

On and after November 1, 1941, and for the duration of this War or until further notice, one copy of any such order must be forwarded to the undersigned at the same time as the order is issued.

In every case, full details as to purposes for which the steel will be used must be shown on the copy of the order sent to the undersigned.

WEIGHTS OF MATERIALS INVOLVED MUST BE SHOWN IN EACH INSTANCE EITHER IN POUNDS OR IN NET TONS OF 2,000 POUNDS PER TON.

FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH THESE INSTRUCTIONS MAY RESULT IN OFFICIAL CANCELLATION OF ORDERS.
