Mayonnaise Stretcher

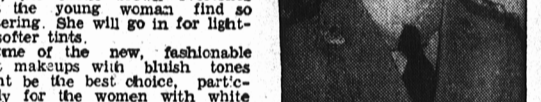

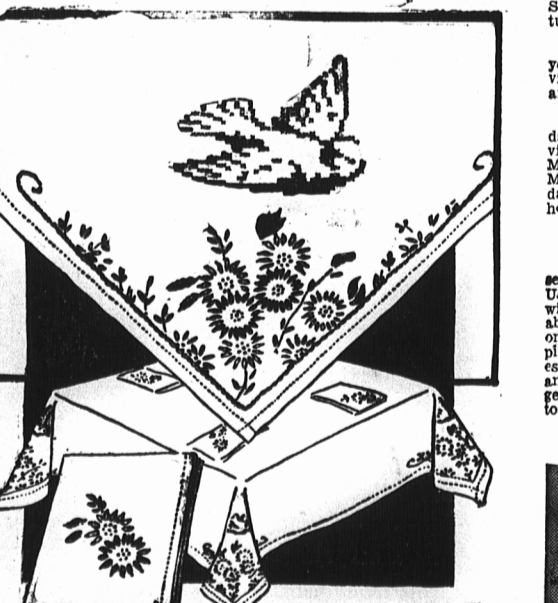
