Death of Mr. John Saunders

The Guardian deeply regrets to report the death at 6:30 yesterday morning of Mr. John Saunders, one of Charlottetown's most widely known and respected citizens. The late Mr. Saunders was born at North Wiltshire nearly eighty years ago, resided in Charlottetown since his boyhood and as a young man entered the employ of the late Robert Bridges, meat dealer and exporter. In 1881 he began business on his own account.

For a time he had as his partner his brother-in-law, Mr. Norman Campbell, the firm being known as Saunders & Campbell. Later, on the retirement of Mr. Campbell, a partnership was formed by Mr. Saunders and Mr. Peter Newsome and their establishment was removed from Kent Street to the old market building. After its destruction by fire they secured quarters in the new market building where the business is still carried on under the old firm name. Eight years ago Mr. Newsome retired from the business and the late Mr. E. G. Saunders became junior partner with his father.

The business activities of the late Mr. Saunders extended throughout the Province, and wherever he was known he was justly regarded as a man of the highest honor and integrity. His word was his bond, and under the circumstances it is not to be wondered at that he achieved a marked success in the commercial life of the city and Island. He was an importer of cattle occasionally from as far as Ontario. He was also an extensive exporter and with the passing of years the business of the firm continued to expand.

In the moral and spiritual welfare of the community Mr. Saunders at all times showed a keen interest. He was a consistent member of St. James' Presbyterian Church, and in his daily walk and conversation he exemplified those Christian principles upon which his unflinching faith was founded.

Keenly interested also in the social and political life of the Province, Mr. Saunders took an active interest in every public question and could discuss such matters shrewdly and intelligently. He was a strong and loyal supporter of the Conservative party and was ever ready with counsel and assistance in carrying out the principle for which the party stands.

There are left to mourn his wife, formerly Miss Margaret Campbell, one son, Victor, and four daughters, namely Mrs. Lorne Unsworth, Mrs. Ernest Seller, Mrs. K. M. Martin, all of Charlottetown, and Mrs. Victor Haslam of New York, to all of whom the Guardian extends sincere sympathy.

The funeral will be from the late residence, 56 Orlebar Street, on Sunday, Oct. 21st, at Mount Herbert Cemetery, the service starting at 2 p. m.

Here, April 18, 1775, Robert Newman, sexton, displayed the lanterns that flashed from the tower a message that sent Paul Revere in haste to Lexington to give warning that the Regulars were coming. "From the tower of this Church General Gage watched the Battle of Bunker Hill, June 17, 1775. In this battle Major Pitcairn was fatally wounded and taken from the field by his son, who kissed his father good-bye and returned to the battle.
