reservation for San Francisco, for which the price is eight dollars, but as there is only one night between here and Frisco, I conclude to wait till bedtime, and take the risk, which I afterwards got for one dollar and eighty-eight cents. Here the vegetation is farther on than in Victoria, but not so luxuriant. I notice here in full bloom, daisies, dandelions, buttercups and wild mustard. Garden vegetables are up in rows, and we pass numerous large nurseries. Tonight after midnight we will pass Mount Shasta, 14,400 feet in height, whose summit is always white with snow, and I am sorry we will not get this view.

Two incidents took place in the night; the first one, we see a man on the track waving a torch, and on slowing down we find a slide of rock and clay has taken place, which, however, has been almost cleared off by workmen, and we are not long delayed. The second is a train off the track, and we are delayed for three hours, which will make us later getting into San Francisco. One of the cars was all smashed up, and lying on its side. In the morning we are in California, in the northern part of the State. The mountain peaks are white with snow, and a heavy white frost is on the ground; the grain which is up about six inches is withered and yellow, and I learn that they are having a dry year. As we pass along I notice a man asleep, wrapped in his blankets under an oak tree. Soon we come out into the Sacramento Valley, and pass through large fields of alfalfa, which in one place they were cutting for hay, and in another place they were loading the cured hay on wagons. As we get into the open country we pass alternately flocks of
