Gov. General Praises Canada's Camping Spirit

OTTAWA, July 16 (CP)—Viscount Alexander had some words of praise for Canada's camping spirit tonight at the official opening of Queen Juliana Hospital at Shirley Bay Boys Camp, 12 miles west of Ottawa.

"The British experts have a very real value for the young apart from the pleasure they give to those who attend them," the Governor General said in an address prepared for delivery.

He described the hospital, named after Queen Juliana of the Netherlands who spent the war years in Ottawa, as "a tribute to the genuine interest of Her Majesty the Queen of the Netherlands in the welfare of the Canadian people." The Queen contributed to the fund for construction of the new hut at the Y.M.C.A. camp.

Camps were important because they encouraged development of healthy bodies, developed good attitudes and taught boys how to get along with each other, and provided training in many skills, both physical and cultural.

"In a democratic country, such an arrangement is excellent and will do a lot towards what surely must be one of the chief aims—the training in citizenship and the development of leadership."

Claims Radar Secrets Captured By Canadians

HAMBURG, Germany, July 16.—(Reuters)—Dr. Kurt Bley, German scientist and inventor, said today German radar equipment was captured during the Canadian-led raid on Dieppe, France, Aug. 19, 1942.

In one of a series of articles on radar secrets, published in the British-controlled German-language newspaper, Die Welt, Dr. Bley said the wave-lengths used by Germans were studied in the laboratories of Malvern College and that exact information was obtained on the functioning of the apparatus.

Dr. Bley said German radar experts knew the meaning of the raid. They realized that the removal of German radar equipment by the Allies would result in jamming of the wave lengths in use and consequent "blinding of our electric eyes."

Of the raid itself, Dr. Bley wrote: "While the alarm is sounding, (Canadian) soldiers dashed into the anti-aircraft centre and seized the Wuerzburg radar apparatus. They have been carefully instructed not to bother about removing the reflex aerials, which were not technically interesting.

"They cut the most important parts of the apparatus out of its frame with steel saws, namely the transmitter and receiver.

"The apparatus was extremely heavy, but the invaders succeeded in removing it in the darkness by the use of a special device for removing the radar set from the craft and (went) on their way back to England.

"Wild rumors circulated in Germany over the Dieppe raid, it was whispered that the British had seized a Wuerzburg apparatus and had discovered the secrets of radar."

They did not need to discover radar secrets in Britain, continued Dr. Bley. "The Wuerzburg apparatus proved no surprise for the experts of the communications research establishment any more than the British night fighter apparatus did for us."

But the laboratories of Malvern College, they studied the wavelengths used and obtained exact information on the functioning of the apparatus.

The British experts also found out the effective radius of the Wuerzburg and its strength. Above all they wanted to know whether the British were using the frequencies. They found it had none.

WORLD CONVENTION IN 1950 The Churches of Canada will play host to delegates from 70 countries who will meet in Toronto for a World Convention on Christian Education, August 10 to 16, 1950. Twelve such World Conventions have been held in the past sixty years, but this will be the first one to come to Canada.

It is expected that some 6,500 delegates from many different races and nations will assemble for consultation, fellowship and inspiration. The Convention will be held on the beautiful campus of Toronto University and its affiliated colleges. Lord Macintosh of Halifax, London, England, President of the World Council of Christian Education, will preside and will have the assistance of men like J. Arthur Rank, and Dr. Luther A. Weigle, as officers of the Council.

Since delegates from many countries will find it difficult through economic and foreign exchange problems to come to Toronto without financial assistance, the World Council is planning to raise funds to assist them, through a "Welcome Book" to which every Sunday school teacher in Canada will be asked to contribute. The "Welcome Book" project was inspired by a similar action taken when 10,000 young Christians in Norway signed their names in a similar book and contributed approximately \$10,000 to make it possible for the World Conference of Christian Youth to meet in Oslo in July, 1947, from which Canadian youth have received such inspiration and help. Now Canada has a chance to show herself no less hearty in her welcome to a World Conference.
