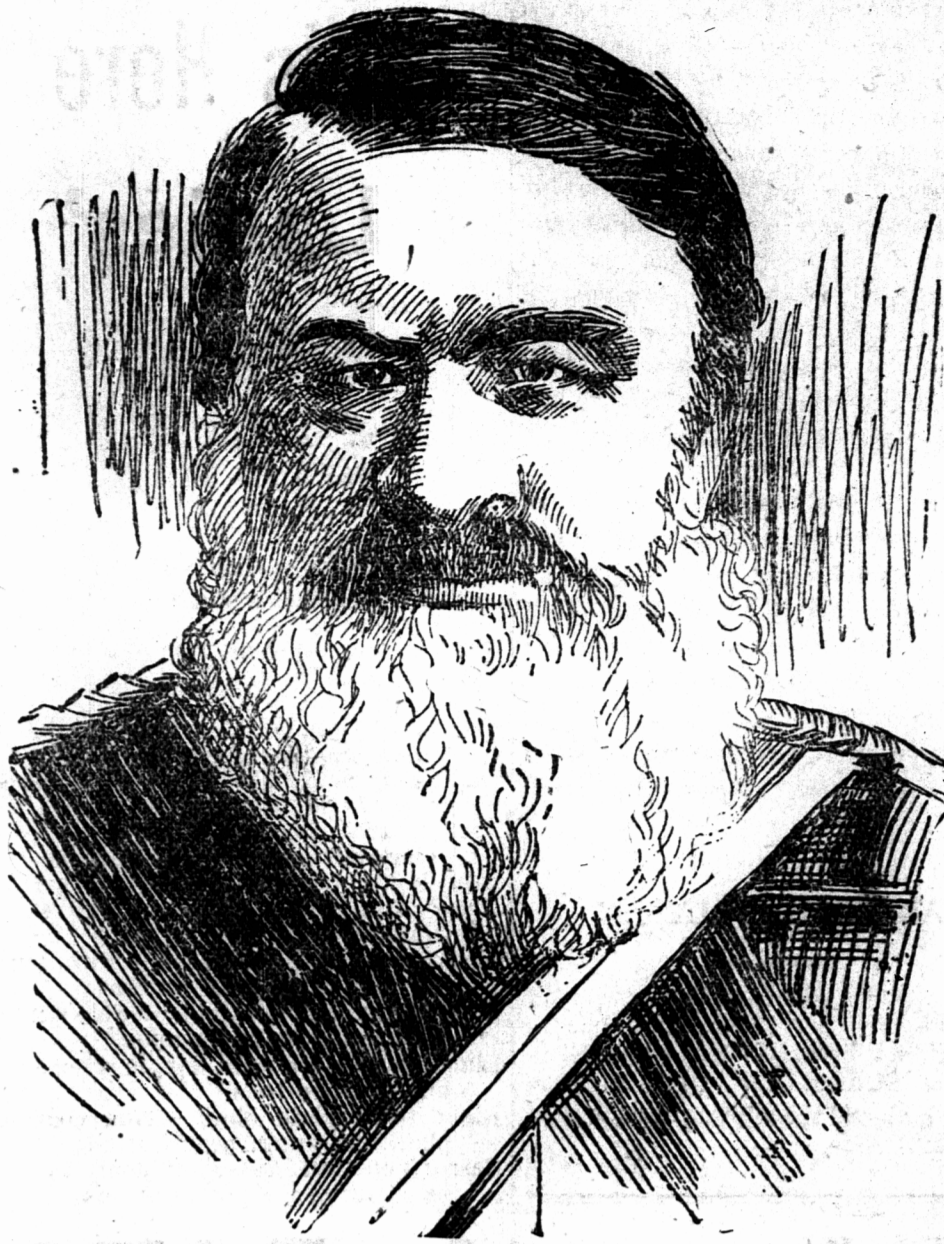

WAR BETWEEN S. ARMY

And Ballington Booth of the Volunteers of America.

While still declining to give, except in court, his reasons for wishing to change his name from William Booth to Charles Brandon Booth, Commander Ballington Booth, of the volunteers of America says in the Tribune to-day: "There has been a report which has been made to the press, which I wish to confirm, viz. that everybody thought the Salvation Army and the Volunteers of America, of which I am President, were on the most friendly terms. So far as the Volunteers are concerned they have sought to avoid opposition, friction and any bitterness, but all the Salvationists could do to thwart our purposes, to injure our influence as officers, has been done. Not satisfied with the cruelty inflicted on Mrs. Booth, not satisfied with calling our people 'traitors' 'devils' and 'street walkers' their leader, Commander Booth-Tupper, has openly in their councils told the officers to pray for our downfall. They have gone over our heads to the landlords of our halls, offering them more money if they would put our people out and rent them the halls. They have sent circulars around saying we were heavily in debt, which is not the case. "Apart from the legal reasons which we shall present in court, does anyone wonder that our boy should want to cease to be associated with a movement which has so bitterly opposed and belied his father and mother. I will make known more later. The Salvationists have even given out that Mrs. Booth's picture should be in the rogues gallery."

RUSSIA READY IS TO FIGHT

Has Mobilized a Quarter of a Million Men and Black Sea Fleet.

LONDON, March 23.—The Standard gives double leaded prominence to the following despatch from Odessa:—"There can no longer be any doubt as to the object of the warlike preparations now being completed in South Russia. Nearly 250,000 troops have already been mobilized for active service. The Black Sea squadron with transports is held in instant readiness. "The tension in the relations between St. Petersburg and the Sublime Porte becomes every day more acute. The position is looked upon with the greatest apprehension. "If the Ottoman government, supported by Germany, should prove stubbornly intractable with regard to Russia's concessionary demands in Asia Minor, serious complications must inevitably ensue. The Russian garrisons in the Caucasus and along the Armenian frontier have been increased four fold, and are equipped for active service."

TO PURGE WICKED BOSTON.

The City To Be Stirred From End to End for Two Years

Boston, March 24.—That Boston is not the respectable "Old Lady" that she has been represented by her citizens is evidenced by the fact that 300 clergymen, representing all the evangelical churches in this vicinity, have combined to start a gigantic crusade against vice to continue for at least two years. "Wicked" Boston is to be stirred from end to end on a scale more extensive than anything of the sort that has been attempted since the famous Moody campaign of twenty-five years ago. The religious part of the populace is in earnest, and several meetings for consultation among those already identified with the movement have been held. While the plan contemplates what usually is termed a "revival," it does not imply the use of the sensational and emotional features that usually are included in the revival category. The idea rather is to utilize the deepening of religious feeling and effort among professing Christians and their personal effort coupled with special meetings, not only in churches but in homes and business resorts. This sort of work is to continue active through a period of at least two years. Within a few days a formal plan of the outlines of the campaign will be issued and a meeting of Christian business men will be held to co-operate with the clergymen who thus far have carried forward the enterprise.

The recent death of John Simpson, Esq. of Bay View has removed from among us the oldest person in the locality. He was born in 1810, and remembered well when the news of Waterloo came to the Island, about two months after the battle was fought. Though in his 90th year he retained his faculties, till almost the last, and had a vivid recollection of all the happenings, social, political and religious of the last 80 years. He was married almost sixty years ago and his wife survives him. He was the last surviving grand-son of William Simpson, the first settler in Bay View.

Important Agreement Secured by Secretary Hay.

BRITISH COLUMBIA POLITICS

LONDON, March 23.—(Special)—The papers here all praise Secretary Hay, for his work for the open door policy in China.

WHAT IS AGREED TO.

Hays' correspondence began in September last and on 20th March he had secured the adherence of Great Britain, France, Germany, Russia, Italy and Japan to his proposal.

The powers bind themselves not to interfere with existing arrangements of any power at present treaty ports, and to admit to ports in their spheres of influence the goods of all at equal rates of duty, the duties to be paid to the Chinese Government.

HALIFAX, March 23.—(Special)—The steamer Manchester Commerce arrived today and reports that a fire on board on Saturday last destroyed much valuable cargo and nearly caused the loss of the ship.

THE WEATHER.

WASHINGTON, March 23.—(Special)—Partly cloudy, fresh northerly to easterly winds.

The Baptist congregation of Cavendish and Bay View have decided to erect a new church building, and have already secured most of the funds required. The site of the new building has been chosen in the vicinity of the parsonage. This will make it much more convenient for the congregation.
