-CABIN CRUISER BUILT AT SUMMERSIDE - Last Saturday morning, Mr. Paul Harding, of Summerside launched a cabin cruiser type yacht that he has been building here all the winter and is a very handsome craft. She was tried out in the afternoon and gave a good account of herself. This vessel, named "The Rainbow" is thirty-five feet long, with a beam of seven feet and six inches and is powered with a six-cylinder 65 horse-power Buick engine. She is electrically lighted and is equipped with a one-mile ray search light. The cabin is fitted with toilet and wash bowl. The hull is built of white oak and white pine and the cabin is all finished in quartered oak. This handsome and sea-worthy craft was designed by Mr. James Straight, of Summerside, assisted by Mr. Stanley Gaudet.-S.
