**MRS. RICHMOND HELD FOR THE GRAND JURY**

Sent Up on Charge of Killing McTavish - Witness Tells of Happenings in the Boarding House Where Man Was Murdered.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Aug. 7.—Mrs. Elizabeth Richmond was held without bail by Judge Almy in the Cambridge district court this week for the murder of Stewart McTavish in the Hotel Florence, East Cambridge, on Friday, July 23. She was at once taken to East Cambridge jail, where she will await the sitting of the September grand jury at Lowell.

McTavish had tarried for a few days at the hotel previous to starting on his vacation from his duties at the state colony for the insane in Gardner, where he was employed. It was his intention to go to his home.

Mrs. Richmond, who appeared in court stylishly attired in a silk shirt-waist and a black silk skirt, was represented by Ralph W. Gloag.

She followed the proceedings with the utmost care, and seven times summoned Atty. Gloag to her side. They conferred earnestly on each occasion, and at the end of each conference the lawyer began a new line of cross-examination on the witness, of whom 20 had been summoned, but of whom only four were called.

Medical Examiner William D. Swan first testified to the condition of the body and the nature of the wounds from which death resulted. He said there were several of these about the head, one a gunshot wound on the right side.

John Drohan, the cook at the Hotel Florence, described the finding of McTavish's body and the position of the body on the bed when he and Timothy J. Clifford, a border discovered it.

"Mrs. Richmond was lying on the kitchen floor," he said. "I had previously seen her in her sitting room."

He continued, "and the last time I saw McTavish alive was on Thursday. I did not see Mrs. Richmond on that day."

He was asked as to whether or not he knew there was an ax in the cellar.

"I did," he replied. "I have used it many times."

He said that he had seen McTavish coming from a room on the top floor, and that Mrs. Richmond was lying in the bed in the room in a drunken condition. He said that the arrival of McTavish in the house had been the cause of comment among the boarders. One of them, Clifford, who was with him when the body was discovered, had remarked that the "herring choker" was back again, and that there was sure to be trouble at the house.

"You didn't kill McTavish, did you?" asked District Attorney Higgins.

"I did not," replied Drohan.

Timothy J. Clifford declared he came home to dinner on Friday and found Mrs. Richmond on the kitchen floor, "dead to the world."

"I asked Drohan if he was there and he said he didn't know. I remarked that we'd better find out. We then went upstairs and found the door of his room locked. We got it opened and found the body on the bed."

"My God, she's killed him," shouted Drohan. "I heard the shot but thought it was in the street."

"I never saw 'ks U's before, and

hope I never will again," he finished impressively as he described the scene in the room.

"Did you kill McTavish?" asked the district attorney.

"No. Do you think I'm crazy?" No," answered Clifford.

John A. O'Hern testified to paying a fifteen dollar tax for Mrs. Richmond at Cambridge City Hall on the day of the murder. He said that she was sober when she gave him the money and asked him to pay the bill.

Atty. Gloag declared no evidence had been introduced to support the charge of murder against Mrs. Richmond, but Judge Almy found probable cause and ordered the woman held.

**THE BATTLE FOR CHEAPER ATLANTIC CABLE SERVICE.**

During the sitting of the Imperial Press Conference the question of cheaper cable rates was much discussed and the Pacific Cable Company announced its intention of cutting its rates on the wire on first August. It was hoped that this would have brought about a corresponding reduction in Atlantic cable rates. Now it is announced by the companies concerned that no reduction will be made. The Marconi Company is doing a limited business in press messages across the Atlantic at half the cable rates, but the land telegraph companies connecting charge full commercial rates on these press messages. The cables and the land lines work together against the wireless. It is a good deal like our three short haul rates in freight transportation. The wireless message crosses the Atlantic cheaply, but pays twice as much for land transportation at each end as the cable message pays. This makes out a strong case for an all-British cable and land service under government control across the Atlantic and Canada. Possibly, as Mr. Marconi hopes, the wireless service across the Atlantic will soon be devoted to the extent that will enable it to transport the full volume of press messages, and also to transmit them to their destinations on land.

**CITY POLICE COURT**

At the Police Court yesterday morning three drunks, Martin Power, John McLeod and Joseph Cameron, were each fined five dollars or thirty days. **MANY TRAGIC OCCURRENCES IN THE SIBERIAN PROVINCES.**

HALIFAX, Aug. 9.—Despatches convey intelligence of many tragic occurrences throughout the Province. Mrs. Havelock Akerley, Port Greville, is dead and her six months old baby is badly burned as a result of carbolic acid poison administered by Mrs. Akerley while in a fit of despondency. She was getting better from typhoid fever. Dr. Fillmore, of Advocates, dropped dead from heart trouble. Following closely upon the tragedy at Port Greville comes an attempted suicide at West Bay of William Henwood, who shot himself above the heart. He cannot recover. Henwood is supposed to have been drinking, and asked the daughter of Benjamin Phinney, with whom he boarded, to go walking with him. She refused, and he fired the shot which proved fatal.

Two drowning accidents occurred at North Sydney last night, when Chas. Long met death while swimming near the Nova Scotia Coal Co's pier, George Lerou, eight years old, fell of the same wharf during the afternoon while alone. He was not missed till tea time. His body was found with the face bruised, where he fell on the stones.

Percy Quinlan, ten years old, was run over by a car at Liverpool and crushed to death! William Shields, 22 years old was drowned in a pond two miles from Springhill. The young man and several others left home to have a swim and went out on a raft. He dived and did not come to the surface again.

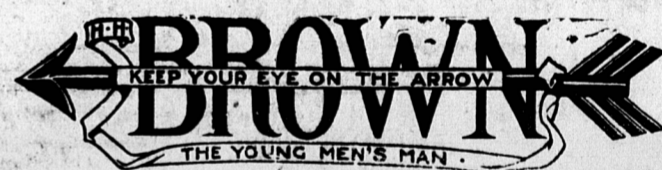
