## German Bishop Is "horrified" At family gaps

LONDON, Feb. 2.—(CP)—The outspoken Protestant Bishop of Wurtemberg, risking reprisals by the Gestapo, has dared to criticize National Socialism and to suggest that Hitler and other German leaders lacked the courage to admit they planned to suppress all religious beliefs.

The bishop, addressing a conference of the Provincial Church of Wurtemberg—equivalent to an English Diocesan conference in this country—warned the people interested in home affairs had lost confidence in leadership and become "gaps" in the war.

"When we glance at the newspapers we are often overcome with horror at the number of gaps that are appearing in our families and especially in the body of the clergy," he said, according to the text of his address received in London.

### Colleges Closed

"An exceptionally high number of clergy had been called up for military duty, he said, and four training colleges in Wurtemberg were closed in breach of a solemnly written law. Letters of complaint to the government were not answered and an appeal on behalf of Hitler was rejected. On account of the many pre-occupations of the Fuehrer."

"As member of the community within a state which calls itself a people's state, have we not the right to be heard?" he asked. "In wartime in other lands they try to bridge the gaps in the home front. In Germany the opposite seems to be the goal."

"Do they (the government) think unifying the Christian population, which counted 95 per cent in the last official reckoning?"

### New State Talk

The Bishop referred to a pamphlet issued by the Deputy Gauleiter of Wurtemberg, which talked about a "new state" and explained that National Socialism aimed at bringing the people to realize the "natural prior claim of belonging to the nation in contrast to self-chosen adherence to any confession." Wartime, he continued, was the right time to put forward these ideas as they would only find acceptance abroad if they were duly welcomed in Germany.

"We do not wonder at party quarrels, that we have fared so badly in our own life in Wurtemberg," the bishop said. "We cannot wonder that there are rumors that, when once victory has been won, decisive measures against the church will be taken in hand."

"It is terrible for me to have to say this. New facts are needed in order to awaken again a confidence which was there once in great measure."

## Pair of blizzards Caused two deaths

Relaxation of censorship restrictions yesterday permitted disclosure of a pair of blizzards which ravaged the Maritimes Jan. 27, 28 and 29, halting street transportation, causing at least two deaths in the Halifax area and crippling coal production in industrial Cape Breton.

The first storm came up on the afternoon of Jan. 27 and continued until morning spreading a half-foot blanket over most of the region. Winds of gale force blew up during the night of Jan. 28, and snow again began falling shortly after midnight, continuing until late in the following afternoon.

Three training planes from the Service Flying Training School near Summerside were caught in the air when the first storm struck. All managed to make safe landings.

New Brunswick escaped the full brunt of the storms. The snowfall was lighter in that province, though some roads were blocked. (Prince Edward Island was only lightly touched by the first storm, a week ago today. The Thursday blizzard was the worst this winter, however, with winds reaching a 40-mph-per-hour velocity with the average 24-hour velocity 31 miles. Weather observers estimated the snow-fall at about ten inches. The temperature was approximately 8 to 10 degrees above zero. Apparently the last storm began later in this Province than on the mainland. At Charlottetown snow began falling shortly after daybreak on the 28th and continued until late at night.)

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 2.—(CP)—What the all-star game is to baseball, a fabulous clash of the sport's greatest performers, the \$50,000 Widener Handicap will be to United States horse racing this year.

Most every outstanding thoroughbred in training is eligible to grace the post before a glittering assemblage at Hialeah Park March 7. They alone will hold the spotlight. The rival \$100,000 Santa Anita classic, like all California racing, has been cancelled because of the war.

History will be in the making because never before in America have so many ace horses been pointed for one race—an entry list of 90 and it reads like a racing honor roll.

A quick of fate barred Whirlaway, the only notable horse not eligible. Owen Warren Wright, with his eye on a new money-winning record, pointed the Kentucky Derby winner for the rich California prize and did not enter him for the Widener.
