IMPRESSIVE Premier Given Warm Reception By Parliament

Thousands Attend Mass Funeral Of Dead In Maxim Gorky Disaster.

(By John Lloyd, Associated Press Foreign Staff) (A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MOSCOW, May 20—Urns containing the ashes of 42 of the victims of the Maxim Gorky super-plan disaster were deposited in the walls of the monastery of the new Virgin tonight, and coffins with the bodies of the seven others were buried alongside.

Planes Drone Overhead

Twenty-seven airplanes flew in formation over the scene while high aviation officials delivered fervent orations over the urns and coffins. Relatives of the victims and fellow workers of the Central Aerodynamic Institute carried the coffins and urns into the graveyard just outside the monastery.

Under this plan the Polish residents of Pomerania, as the Corridor is known in Poland, would be moved to the newly-acquired territory in White Russia.

Third Crash Averted

That the crash of a third plane was averted at the time of the disaster only because an endangered pilot beat a frightened motion picture operator into submission was disclosed.

Y. Rybushkin, who was piloting a third plane from which pictures were being taken of the Maxim Gorky, said after the huge craft hurtled downward his operator-passenger leaped upon him and attempted to strangle him to get him away from the controls.

Baldwin To Take Over Premiership?

LONDON, May 21—(Tuesday)—Rumors of a cabinet reconstruction to take place next month were intensified today. Speculation and gossip were keen in the lobbies of the House of Commons until early morning.

Several morning newspapers asserted it was definitely decided that Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald would hand over the leadership of the government to Stanley Baldwin, Lord President of the Council, in June. It was believed, however, the prospective changes would not be announced before Whitehall.

Death Toll Reaches 20 In U. S. Flood Areas

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OKLAHOMA CITY, May 20—The death list of tornado and flood victims in the southern and southwestern United States crept up past 20 tonight.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, May 20—Premier R. B. Bennett returned to the House of Commons today from his long absence, made two or three speeches but failed to clear the air on the leading political question of the day—whether he would continue to lead the Conservative party through the election campaign.

Gallery seats were at a premium at the opening and the Prime Minister was greeted with wild acclaim from all sides. His two political opponents, Liberal leader Mackenzie King and Progressive leader Robert Gardiner welcomed him back and expressed hope his health would continue to improve.

When the Prime Minister rose to reply his opening words were interrupted for many rounds by desk-pounding from Conservatives, Liberals and Progressives alike. He said London doctors had told him he might recover full health if he took care of himself and he also warned the House with public affairs with his accustomed vigor and zeal. But that was as far as he went.

Although Mr. Bennett said he must have rest, his actions appeared to belie his words. A few minutes later the Liberal leader asked questions concerning Canadian-Japanese trade, directing them to the Minister of Trade and Commerce. Although the Minister rose to reply it was the Prime Minister who answered the question.

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BRITAIN MOURNS DEATH OF LAWRENCE

Simple Funeral For "Uncrowned King Of Arabia" Planned.

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WOOL, Dorsetshire, England, May 20—The late Col. T. E. Lawrence, who achieved a hero's role in Arabia during the Great War, lived in recent years on an income of £100 (about \$486), a close friend disclosed today.

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Ethiopia Urges League To Halt Italy's War Plans

Emperor Haile Selassie Accuses Rome Of Evading International Obligations In Personal Message To Council.

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) GENEVA, May 20—Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia got in the first blow as the Council of the League of Nations assembled today to review his menacing border quarrel with Italy.

In a personal telegram to Geneva the "King of Kings" appealed to the League to halt Italy's huge program of military preparations in northeast Africa and accused Rome of evading international obligations.

INCREASE IN CANADA'S TRADE

25 Percent Increase Compared With April Last Year.
