NO COMPROMISE!

The following telegram was received by The Guardian on Sunday night, but a part of it seemed so incredible that it was held for further consideration. We now conclude it best to give it publicity in order that a most dangerous and nefarious suggestion may be subjected to the killing frost of public indignation at the earliest possible moment. The telegram is as follows:

"OTTAWA, April 16—(Special)—A feeling is growing in Government circles here that the movement to send another delegation from P. E. Island regarding the Tunnel and another ice-breaking steamer is evidence that the Island Government is in financial distress and would cheerfully accept in lieu of the Tunnel a cash subsidy and that a compromise could be arranged on that basis.

"It is understood that private letters from the Island have suggested this." We acquit the Provincial Government in advance of any design or intention to accept a cash subsidy in lieu of a Tunnel. One tidal wave of public indignation would sweep out of existence into the gulf of oblivion any Government which would propose or accept such a ruinous compromise. If any such feeling is

MR. HALES' LETTER TO "THE SUN."

Secretary Hales of the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company has written a letter to the St. John Sun attempting to contradict some of the reported statements of the Ottawa Delegates before the St. John Board of Trade. For that matter Mr. Hales' statements in his letter to The Sun are easily open to the same effective answer as was before made by Mr. Fall in The Guardian's columns. We prefer for the present to treat them in more kindly fashion, inasmuch as Mr. Hales is evidently under a misapprehension as to the attitude of the Delegates toward the Steam Navigation Company.

The Delegates at no time or place assumed an attitude of hostility toward the Company. They did in the strongest way they could point out the great disadvantage to the people of the Island from having to pay three short haul rates on products shipped to or goods received from St. John, Halifax, Sydney or other mainland points and the necessity of twice transshipping such goods and products by the way with the resultant damage, which in the case of fresh meats is often 20 per cent on their value.

The Steam Navigation Company is not to blame for this twice handling of the goods in transit. That the Company has a right to be paid the cost of this handling in addition to a fair share of the freight charges in proportion to the distance of carriage is cheerfully recognised. That on many lines the Company's charges for transportation are thought to be high is freely stated, but that is beside the main issue. The contention of the Delegates and of The Guardian upon which the chief stress has been laid is that the Island is entitled to equal rates for equal distance to those prevailing on the Mainland and that this great boon, with entire relief from the cost and damage of breaking bulk and twice handling the goods in transit would be gained by the construction of the Tunnel.

THE COMING EMPIRE DAY.

The Guardian has received from the Earl of Meath a communication asking that the coming 24th of May shall be observed with increasing enthusiasm as Empire Day. His Lordship points out that it is especially desirable that the day shall be observed in the schools, "so that the rising generation may be associated with their elders in hymns of praise and thanksgiving which should on that day rise to Him in Whose hands rests the fates of all empires and peoples." It is added as a suggestion that the National Flag be hoisted on May 24th on places of worship, public buildings, schools and private dwellings throughout the Empire and that the clergy of all denominations be invited on May 21st to allude to the coming celebrations in their sermons and addresses and "to impress on their congregations that righteousness alone exalteth a nation, and that no empty boasting should enter into the program of the day". The Guardian heartily endorses the spirit of these proposals, and will return to the subject at an early day.

The reception accorded to Bishop McDonald last evening on his return from Rome and the Holy Land was very hearty, enthusiastic and imposing.

The Ottawa Delegates will report to a public meeting in Market Hall, Summerside tonight. It is intimated that there may also be other speakers. If the effort should be the same as that realised by the meeting at which the Delegation reported in Charlottetown, it will go far to remove any remaining objections to the Tunnel and to convince all present that this great national work ought to be immediately put under construction.
