C. W. L. Organized In North Rustico

A meeting was held in Stella Maris Hall, North Rustico on Nov. 27 to organize a sub-division of the Catholic Women's League. Former Islander Dies In Vancouver

A man who lived for the West, and spent 48 years serving it as a railroader, died suddenly here Wednesday.

He was 72-year-old B. T. "Ben" Chappell, former Vancouver general superintendent of the C.N.R. from 1929 to 1936, and Manitoba general manager from 1936 to 1942.

He and his wife lived in Hotel Vancouver for a number of years since his retirement. He was a familiar figure in the lobby there. Mr. Chappell moved from his native Charlottetown, P.E.I., in 1885. He went to Winnipeg and took a job as freight clerk with the Northern Pacific and Manitoba Railway. In 1901 the lines were taken over by Mackenzie and Mann, and Mr. Chappell stayed on. The railway was re-named Canadian Northern.

At Winnipeg he worked as checker, switchman, yard foreman and yardmaster.

Kamloops Cowboy

Later he became yardmaster and trainmaster at Port Arthur, then trainmaster at North Battleford. Then he was transferred to Saskatoon, and later Vancouver, as superintendent.

In 1919 he became general superintendent at Saskatoon. During this period, Saskatchewan Cree Indians elected him "Chief Iron Horse," and presented him with a feather war bonnet and buckskin coat.

Mr. Chappell came back to Vancouver as general superintendent from 1929 to 1936, then held the same post at Winnipeg until he retired in 1942.

Community Service

One of his treasured possessions was a cowboy hat presented when he was made an honorary member of the Upper Country Cowboys' Association at a Kamloops exhibition.

He was a director of the Exhibition Association here, a member of Canadian Club and Rotary International until he was moved to Winnipeg. In 1936 he was a director of the city's golden jubilee committee.

Known as a man of sound judgment, quick decisions and vigorous action, "Ben" Chappell was quick to make friends and to win the admiration and respect of business associates.

He took an active interest in fairs and exhibitions wherever he was posted, and undertook considerable community service in other ways.

Here he was honorary vice-president of the B.C. Safety League, an honorary life member of the Association of Pacific Coast Port Authorities, a director of the New Westminster Pacific Coast Terminals, and a director of GTP Dock Company at Seattle.

He was a member of Gizeh Shrine Temple here.

He is survived by Mrs. Chappell, two sons, Ben Jr. of Winnipeg and Edward, Fernie; a daughter, Mrs. R. E. Potter, Victoria, and five grandchildren. A brother and two sisters are in Vancouver and another sister lives at Charlottetown.

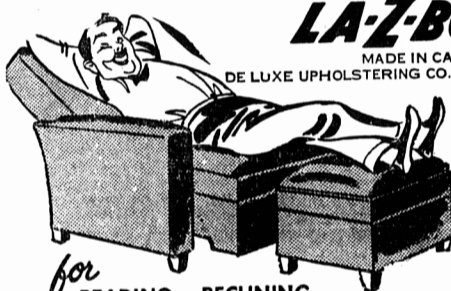
