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Wit And Eloquence

Scotch! (Laughter).

Col. MacKinnon referred to the importance of the price maintenance movement instituted in England by Sir William Glyn-Jones and now being organized in Canada by the Pharmaceutical Association, which formed the subject of Dr. Stanbury's address at the convention, Thursday morning.

Mr. G. A. Burbridge, Halifax, chairman of the C. P. A. Council, followed with the declaration that although he had taken the Association eighteen years to get to Charlottetown as a convention, he felt sure it would not be anything like that time before a second visit takes place. He had had such a pleasant time that he was loath to leave these hospitable shores. He paid a well-earned compliment to the fame of the Island's specialty, the silver foxes and lovely ladies. The Association has had its years of struggle, but today it is a lusty youth, in very good health, and going forward to a sturdy manhood.

Dr. Stanbury, Toronto, regretted that he had not had time during this all-too-brief visit of courtesy to "The Cozy Corner of Canada" the company of some of the beautiful ladies of whom Mr. Burbridge had spoken so eloquently. If the Association is to function properly it must bring its message frequently to every province and I visits should be made by at least some officer representing the Dominion Association every year. Only in this way can members become acquainted with each other's needs and find a solution for each other's difficulties.

While there is no organization of local druggists in the city of St. John, members of the profession there are present tonight and no doubt the inspiration derived from this convention will be the means of establishing an organization in that city. The trouble with druggists hitherto has been that they have kept too much apart. There must be consolidation and cooperation of forces; only then will legislatures and departments no longer attempt to hamper the profession with legislation such as has been proposed during the past few years. The Association has secured cheaper alcohol and a further step should be made in securing the non-portable alcohol. The Association has put rubbing alcohol on the market. This can only be sold in the original package and cannot be used for manufacturing purposes or sold as bootleg liquor. It is the intention of the Association to uphold the law and members disobeying the law will not be countenanced. He advised all members to "go in" on the Association's insurance plan this year, as this would still further increase the percentage of rebate.

Mr. E. A. Wible, Toronto, declared himself particularly delighted with the patriotic tone of the Premier's remarks. In his travels he had never heard such a patriotic ringing through the air as his visit. This convention is unique in that now for the first time every province in the Dominion is an active member of the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association. It is fitting that while fifty-eight years ago we had in this city the birth of the Confederation of Canada, today, on its eightieth anniversary, Charlottetown sees the birth of the confederation of the different provincial bodies in one Pharmaceutical Association, spreading from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

The toast, "New President" was generally proposed by Mr. Edwin Vimbey of Montreal, and replied to by President R. E. Harris, whose home is in Lamont, Alberta, and who in the course of his remarks referred to the advantages of the West for settlers. He wished to impress the fact that there is a danger of the drug

business today becoming too much commercialized. Merchandising was all right in its place, but the ethical side of pharmacy should not be overlooked. The pharmacist today is carrying on an art which was old when Moses was a child, and he has reason to be proud of his profession. Members should learn to take their places as men who are a credit not only to their craft but to the communities in which they reside.

"Our Guests" was eloquently proposed by Mr. A. J. Matheson, of O'Leary, who declared however that he saw little necessity of proposing a health to gentlemen who looked so abundantly provided with conditions in every province, sitting out some obvious advantages in each, beginning with Nova Scotia, where they were just seeing the strike situation and have had a change of government. (Laughter.) In this Province we have a disease free cattle area and we are also free from drug addicts. (Applause.)

Hon. James Murdock, Minister of Labor in the Dominion Government, in response said that a Minister of Labor who would rise in his seat at 11 o'clock in the morning to make any extended remarks ought to be impeached. (Laughter.) Coming to the Island a few days ago, he had been fortunate in meeting with the members of the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association and his visit had been one continuous round of entertainment and pleasure. He felt away with a great appreciation of the hospitality of its citizens, with a kind regard for the Province and a desire to do whatever may be in his power at any time and place to further advance and safeguard the proper interests and rights of the people of P. E. Island. (Applause.) Personally he would bid goodbye to his many new friends, friends with the greatest appreciation, hoping for a renewal of the same happy converse in the years to come.

Mr. J. S. Richard, Toronto, who has been a frequent visitor to the Island in former years, said that time had faded very kindly and with the veteran druggists of the Maritime Provinces. Certainly the Island members of the profession must be happy and prosperous, or they could not entertain as they are doing.

Among many amusing anecdotes related by Mr. Richard in the course of his remarks was one about a young man of the Jewish nationality who, requiring the services of a doctor and learning in advance that the charge was five dollars for the first visit and two dollars for subsequent visits, appeared before the medico with the breezy salutation, "Well, doctor, here I am again!"

But the doctor was a Scotchman and equal to the occasion. "Very well," he said as he pocketed the two dollar fee tendered by the wily Israelite, whom he had never seen before, "continue the treatment I gave you the last time." Mr. A. B. Burns, of St. John, added a few words of appreciation as one of the guests.

Dr. J. S. Jenkins was called upon and spoke of the happy relations which existed in this province between the medical and pharmaceutical professions.
